WHAT THEY DIED FROM

The Vital Statistics For December.

CONSUMPTION CLAIMED 21

But 32 Females Among the Total Mortality of 112 for the City of Honolulu.

The vital statistics of Honolulu for the month of December have an especial interest as being the record for the last month of the nineteenth century.

There were 112 deaths during the month out of the total population of 39,306 people. This was a monthly death rate of 2.85 per cent. There were 45 marriages reported and 49 births. A remarkable fact was that of the 112 who passed away but 32 were females.

Of the males who died 21 had consumption. Seventeen were between 40 and 50 years of age, 14 under one year, 13 between 20 and 30, 12 between 30 and 40, eight over 70, six between 50 and 60, the same number between 60 and 70, three between one and five, and one between five and twenty. No male died between five and ten years of age.

Of the females, nine were under one year, three between one and five, two between 10 and 20, seven between 20 and 30, six between 30 and 40, one between 40 and 50, two between 60 and 70, and two over 70.

Fifty-three Hawaiians were numbered among the total 112. There were 19 Chinese, six Portuguese, 19 Japanese, one Englishman, eight natives of the United States and six of other nationalities.

Following were the causes of death assigned: Malarial fever 2, typhoid fever 3, diarrhoea 1, diarrhoea infantile 1, dysentery 2, syphilis congenital 1, septicaemia 1, infantile 6, tuberculosis laryngeal 1, tuberculous cerebral 1, tuberculous pulmonary 17, tuberculosis mesenteric 1, tuberculosis miliary 1, atelectasis 1, old age 5, premature birth 1, congestion 7, convulsions 1, senile dementia 1, paralysis 1, inflammation of spinal cord and membranes 1, beri-beri 2, valve disease of heart 4, asthma 3, bronchitis 4, croup 1, oedema of glottis 1, pleurisy 1, pneumonia 13, pulmonary oedema 1, appendicitis 1, gastritis 1, gastro-enteritis 1, aemia 1, inflammation of intestines 5, cirrhosis 1, liver 1, peritonitis 2, acute nephritis 1, chronic nephritis 2, uremia 1, Bright's disease 1, metritis 1, puerperal convulsions 1, puerperal hemorrhage 1, accidental fall 1, crushed by dray 1, poisons 2, suicide 2.

General Lee has explained that recent remarks did not mean that the United States would hold the title role in the Panama Canal.

Colonel Charles W. Minter of the Sixth United States Infantry has been appointed Governor of the Island of Negros.

The Tammany Committee in New York has just adopted in London a resolution that city in a meeting held last week.

Professor Slaby lectured in Berlin before the Emperor upon his discoveries in wireless telegraphy, on the 23d instant.

An expert silk thief was caught and arrested in Chicago while eating a Christmas dinner with friends at a hotel. The fire in the celebrated burning mine at Summit Hill, Pa., which started forty-two years ago, is now under control.

Sarah Bernhardt played the title role in "Hamlet" last week in New York. Despite her age the play was a success.

Dowager Lady Churchill, a friend of Queen Victoria, was found dead in her bedroom at Osborne Christmas morning.

Senator Hanna says that there is no lobby behind the subsidy bill, and that it is being pushed entirely on its merits.

The Kaiser has conferred the insignia of the Order of the Black Eagle upon the Imperial Chancellor, Count von Helldorf.

A mail sack full of valuable presents and registered letters was stolen at Helena, Montana, when en route to the East.

London Spectator commenting on the Ross incident says the moneyed power endangers American intellectual freedom.

It is reported that the steamer City of Topeka can be saved. She has already been partially repaired and taken to Seattle.

Several officers and soldiers were killed last week in Mexico by rebellious Yaqui Indians. Colonel Pelnao being badly wounded.

A sailing vessel brings word to Seattle of having sighted a vessel bottom up about seventy-five miles north of Cape Fettery.

The members of District Attorney Gardner's staff have protested against Governor Roosevelt's removal of the District Attorney.

Buzza entered a Haywards, California, church and tried to steal the silver sacramental set, but the deacons had hidden it.

INDEPENDENTS ACT.

Committees Appointed and a New Member Is Elected.

The Committee of Thirty of the Independent party, organized for the purpose of framing a municipal charter for Honolulu, met last evening at Foster Hall, Nuuanu street, with F. J. Testa in the chair, and S. Meheula as secretary. Eighteen members were present, who listened to the report of the committee on scope and plan of work. The report was signed by all the members of the committee, and read as follows:

F. J. Testa, Chairman. Sir—The committee on scope and plan of work beg leave to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. That there be selected a finance committee of three men to collect the purpose of defraying expenses of the general committee, that ten members constitute a quorum. 2. A committee on literature, consisting of three members. 3. A committee on statistics, to consist of three members. 4. A committee for municipality, to consist of seven members, the chairman of the first three committees to be members of this committee.

5. A drafting committee for county government, to consist of seven members, of which the chairman of the first three committees shall be members.

Respectfully submitted: A. L. C. Atkinson, Edward C. Rowe, William F. Irvine, M. K. Kookalolo, Allan Herbert, R. N. Boyd, Paul Isenberg.

The report was adopted unanimously. Colonel McCarthy introduced the following resolution, which also passed unanimously: "Resolved, that for the purpose of carrying on the business of this committee, that ten members constitute a quorum."

The resignation of John Cassidy as a member of the committee was read and accepted. Colonel McCarthy moved that a committee of one be appointed to communicate with the executive committee of the Independent party in regard to filling the vacancy.

The motion carried, and J. K. Kaulla was appointed. As the executive committee was meeting in an adjoining room the committee man made his report. That body at once elected J. F. Eckhardt, superintendent of the Queen's Hospital, to fill the vacancy.

The following committees were then selected: Finance—E. C. Rowe, Prince David Kawanakoa, Paul Isenberg. Literary—A. L. C. Atkinson, J. M. Poepe, J. K. Kaulla.

Statistics—Colonel McCarthy, R. N. Boyd, J. H. Wilson. A motion was made that two members should be appointed to act with the chair to select members for the drafting of the municipality and county charters.

The chairman of each of the first three committees being already members of these committees. Four more members for each committee are yet to be appointed.

The committee adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN.

The following provision is contained in Section No. 19, of the "Act to provide a Government for the Territory of Hawaii," approved April 30, A. D. 1900, viz:

"That all contracts made since August twelfth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, by which persons are held for service for a definite term, are hereby declared null and void and terminated, and no law shall be passed to enforce said contracts in any way; and it shall be the duty of the United States marshal to at once notify such persons so held of the termination of their contracts."

Now, therefore, I, Daniel A. Ray, Marshal of the United States for the Territory of Hawaii, in accordance with the requirement of said Act, hereby give notice that any contract for service made since August twelfth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, is hereby declared to be unlawful, and null and void and terminated.
