MUST KEEP THE PEACE

Cummings Put Under Bonds of \$100.

JUDGE WILCOX MORALIZES

Cannot Threaten a Man With Impunity if He Does Owe You Money.

Threats to break another man's cheekbone or his head because he declines to pay the wages claimed by his hired man, are denounced by Judge Wilcox as contrary to a proper interpretation of the law, and also as usually making trouble for the man who is inclined to do violent acts. M. Cummings, formerly a United States Army teamster and packer, found this out to his sorrow in the police court yesterday, whence he had been haled by Liveryman Carty, who had him arrested for threatening to kill him. In Cummings' case the Judge was of the same opinion as Mr. Carty, and believed that if he was not put under police restraint he might carry out his threat. In lieu of a bond for \$100, Cummings will spend the next three months within the four walls of Oahu prison.

The liveryman had a number of witnesses, all of whom testified that Cummings was a bold, bad man, and had picked up a milk bottle to back his assertion that he "would kill Carty," or "break his head." The trouble occurred in Carty's stable Thursday morning. According to the liveryman's story Cummings had worked for him seven nights, and had been engaged to clean off wagons and carriages, hitch up horses, and generally look after Carty's night traffic in rigs. Cummings shirked his work, and as the liveryman said, "He didn't do enough work to earn \$50 a month." Cummings came to him on Thursday morning after his night's work, and demanded his pay at the rate of \$90 a month. Carty told him to go and he would pay him when he got ready. Cummings said he would take his money at once.

"I sez to him," said Carty, "you can go if you want to, but I'll only pay you at the rate of \$5 a month. With that he sez, 'you'll pay me right now, or I'll break your head.' Yes, sir. He said he'd 'break my head.' I saw he was a dangerous man. I told him I'd pay him \$13. He ups and says, 'if you don't pay me what I ask I'll kill you,' and he picks up a bottle near by and comes at me. I got out of the way and called a policeman. I tell you, Judge, I believe my life is in danger if that man is allowed to go free. I believe he will carry out his threat, and I don't think my life is safe a minute. He's a bad man."

Cummings said that he had a touch of rheumatism and decided to quit, and he therefore told Carty to pay him, but that Carty objected to paying him at the rate of \$90 a month. With that he had told the liveryman that he would take it out of him. "I sez to him if you don't pay me \$25 I'll break your jaw, that's what I said. Why, I didn't want to hurt him, and didn't intend to, only I thought I'd scare him by making the play at raising the bottle at him."

The defendant told the court that he came to Honolulu on the transport Conemaugh last October as a teamster, having shipped at Manila to San Francisco and back again. When he arrived here, he and three others were discontented because the four of them had to take care of eighty-eight animals, while fifteen others had only 125, and so he quit the ship with \$65 to his credit. He went to Hilo and returned in time to secure a vacancy in Carty's establishment. He said he had excellent letters of identification and recommendation from the officers of the ship and places where he had previously worked.

"I don't take any stock in these letters of recommendation," said the Judge. "Let me look at a man's face, and that's the recommendation I want. Why, it happens oftener that a man writes a letter of recommendation just to get rid of the man asking for it. I know that for a fact. And as for the officers giving out these letters, why they write thousands of them, and nine times out of ten they don't know the man any better than I do you. This letter of recommendation business is a farce."

"Now, let me tell you another thing. If the United States, that is on the Mainland where the country is big, perhaps you can break a man's head when you want to get money out of him, but down here the place is small, and when you try to do that you will get into trouble every time. You can't go out and take money out of a man's skin. If you want it, why there's a court where you can sue him. It's a bad business to go up to a man and say, 'if you don't give me that money I'll kill you.' You can't do it in Honolulu. Your method of scaring him into paying is not work—not in Honolulu. I'll put you under bonds to keep the peace for \$100, and if you can't furnish the bond, you'll have to go to jail."

Answers in Insurance Suits—Demurrer in Divorce Case.

Lily Josephine Manson, widow of the late George Manson, has been appointed administratrix of the estate of her deceased husband and her bonds set at \$300. George Manson, California, after an absence from Honolulu of some weeks. Here he lived several years and held positions of trust.

NOTES OF THE COURT.

Answers were filed yesterday in the First Circuit Court by the defendants in the following insurance cases: Wong Kong Yim vs. Union Assurance Society; W. W. Ahana vs. Insurance Company of North America; Wing Man Yuen Company vs. Norwich Union Fire Insurance Society; Sing Chan Company vs. New England Insurance Company; Wing Man Yuen Company vs. Scottish Union and National Insurance Company; Choy Look See vs. Scottish Union and National Insurance Company; Choy Look See vs. Royal Insurance Company, and Lin Wo Chan Company vs. The Insurance Company of North America.

The plaintiffs in the case of Wing Wo Tai & Company vs. North German Fire Insurance Company of Hamburg have filed a discontinuance in the First Circuit Court.

A demurrer was filed yesterday in the First Circuit Court by Sylvano de Nobrega, the libellee in the divorce suit of Sibana de Nobrega vs. Sylvano de Nobrega.

An amended bill of complaint was filed in the First Circuit Court yesterday in the case of Alexander Maioho vs. William Maioho et al. The bill sets forth that two of the heirs of Alexander Maioho are confined as lepers on Molokai and that Maulani and George are residents of Honolulu. The complainant claims that he is entitled to one-fifth of the property and requests the court to order a sale and that the money arising therefrom be divided among the heirs.

In the matter of the guardianship of Margaret B. Hitchcock, a minor, William O. Smith, guardian, has petitioned the First Circuit Court to allow his account of the estate and order him discharged. Smith waived his commission and upon filing a proper receipt his petition will be granted.

Chin Man has been appointed administrator of the estate of Yee Chin Fan, deceased, and letters will be issued as soon as he files the proper bond.

Anna M. Gertz has been appointed executrix of the estate of Christian Gertz, deceased.

The account of Yee Yop, the temporary administrator for the estate of Leong Mun Bun, deceased, was allowed in the First Circuit Court and his discharge ordered. Young Hon has been appointed permanent administrator subject to his giving an approved bond of \$500.


