

COUNTIES ARE NAMED

Independent Charter Commission.

FIVE FOR ALL ISLANDS

Kauai and Niihau; Maui, Molokai and Lanai; Oahu, and Two for Hawaii.

Five counties are named in the charter for county government framed by the Independent Charter Commission. They are termed the counties of Kauai, including the Islands of Kauai and Niihau and all the Islands within three nautical miles of their shores; the county of Oahu, including all Islands within the same limit; the county of Maui, including the Islands of Maui, Molokai and Lanai, and all the Islands within the three-mile limit. On Hawaii there will be two counties, as follows: Hilo county, including the districts of Hilo and Kau, and Kamehameha county, including the districts of Kona, Kohala and Hamakua.

The Independent Charter Commission met last evening in Foster Hall and listened to the report of the committee on county government presented by the chairman, W. Erving. It was read section by section and was subjected to much criticism and amendments. Much time was spent on the document at the commencement, but after some sharp parleying, the committee made good headway. The division of counties was the first feature presented and the arrangement of the geographical sections met with little opposition and was adopted as read.

Each county is to be a corporate body with all the powers common to incorporated bodies. The bill provides for three county commissioners for each county, and all suits are to be brought in the name of this board except where authority is allowed by them delegating this authority to some other county officer. It is provided that service can be accepted by the county clerk, his deputy or any member of the county board. The county attorney is to be notified in each instance where a suit is begun by service on the county clerk.

The meeting went into the details of each officer's duties, which are those generally existing in counties. The county clerk is to serve two years and file a bond with two or more sureties. In counties of ten thousand persons his bond shall be \$30,000; in counties of 5,000, \$15,000; in counties of less than 5,000, \$10,000. When the question arose as to whether after two years' time bills for county debts were not presented they should be declared outlawed, L. H. Dee arose quickly and said emphatically: "Let's have some honest dealing. These are technical points which the lawyers would fight out anyhow and get the debts paid. If a county justly owes a debt, let the county pay it. Let's have a good, square deal for everybody."

J. C. Quinn said: "The county should not be to rule the citizens, but the county should be ruled by the citizens, and we want to see everything done squarely."

Upon motion the clause was stricken out of the bill. The bill also provides that the county clerk in all counties not exceeding 5,000 people shall be ex-officio registrar of deeds.

After concluding the reading of the duties of the county clerk the meeting adjourned to meet Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock.

Afterwards the posters will be sold by auction for the benefit of the Eye and Ear Infirmary. Tickets and posters are expected to be ready some time this week.

A young man, giving the name of Kamehameha has been arrested as the principal in the robberies, and with him an accomplice named Kaha, both residents of Waikiki. Ever since last November these petty thefts have been going on, and many places have been pilfered. The servants' quarters at H. J. Nolte's were entered, and two rings stolen.
