MONEY FOR MILITIAMEN

War Department Makes Appropriation.
WILL PAY BONDED DEBT

Attorney General Dole Says That Territorial Government Can Trade Land.

A great deal of important business was transacted at the executive meeting of the Governor's Council yesterday morning, and while it was in session the welcome news came out that the War Department had appropriated \$5,000 a year for the support of the National Guard of Hawaii. The amount is entirely too small, yet small as it is, it will be gratefully received, for the members of the regiment were about ready to disband.

There are nine companies of the First regiment, so that a division of this sum will allot to each company a trifle less than \$500 per month. Out of this amount such things as extra guns, uniforms and other equipment necessary for the use of the regiment must be paid for.

Beside this there are thirteen paid men in the service doing duty as guards of the Government buildings, and each one is entitled to a monthly salary of \$50. The Legislature will be asked to set aside a sum amounting to at least \$30,000 for the maintenance of the guard and unless this is granted it may be necessary to disband.

Governor Dole stated that the report of Brewer & Company showing the necessity for an increase of capital was favorable and consequently approved by him. The Rapid Transit Company also asked to be permitted to increase their capital stock from \$300,000 to \$500,000, and their accompanying report was also approved by the Governor.

A letter from Land Agent J. F. Brown was read stating that Senator Hansborough of Dakota had introduced a bill in the United States Senate providing for the extension of the United States land laws to Hawaii. It was referred to the committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico.

A bill introduced by Representative Dalzell in the House was read by Secretary Cooper, in which \$4,000,000 for the payment of the bonded debt of Hawaii had been allowed, together with \$20,000 for the expense of carrying through the annexation resolution.

The new papers of agreement for the transfer of land at Kawa pond by the Government to the Oahu Railway Company, as submitted by Mr. Hatch, were approved, the deed being made out direct to the company.

E. P. Dole, Attorney General, submitted an opinion in regard to the authority of the Territorial Government to convey land by deed of execution consisting of part land and part money. Citing a hypothetical case, he said: "Suppose that the Government is in possession of a piece of land worth \$5,000 and John Doe owns a piece of land worth \$4,000.

"Now, John Doe wishes to obtain the Government land and to trade his in part payment, paying the difference of \$1,000 in cash. I believe that it is within the power of the Territorial Government to accept his property and deed him the land, placing the money in the treasury."

Mr. Dole also stated that several parties whose names were in his possession were carting the sand away from the Waikiki beach, and that unless it was stopped at once he would issue an injunction restraining them from doing so.

J. L. McCandless submitted a diagram showing the plans of construction of the Rapid Transit Company's overhead trolley and guide wires. The approval of the Council was asked and pictures of the proposed fenders were exhibited, but both diagram and picture will be submitted to an electrical expert before action is taken. Maps were also shown setting forth the proposed fire limits for this city.

HONOR MEMORY OF THE GREAT QUEEN

Throughout this city yesterday the memory of Queen Victoria was generally honored. On every pole in the town and on every ship in the harbor the flags of all nations were half-masted. The various consulates showed the flags of their respective countries at half-mast and a special salute of twenty-one minute guns was fired at the naval station.

PIANO IS MADE OF NATIVE WOOD
Was Manufactured for Prince Cupid by a Boston Firm

Prince Cupid Kalanina'ole is the owner of one of the handsomest upright pianos ever brought to Honolulu. Beyond its intrinsic value, which is in the neighborhood of \$1,000, the piano possesses additional interest on account of the materials of which the outer shell is made. The piano is built entirely of koa wood sent from the Islands to Chickering, Boston, by whom the workmanship was done.

The beautiful wood is polished to a rare degree of brilliancy. The wood is very dark and almost clear of graining. The panels, turned work and rounded corners are perfect, and present an appearance of richness seldom achieved in piano building. It is smaller than usual and exceedingly quaint in design. It smacks of the old-fashioned days of the beginning of the nineteenth century.

On the front panels above the keyboard is emblazoned the coat-of-arms of Prince Cupid, a small oval design in green and gold, with the words, "Kulla-Kanuu," surmounted by a crown. No other marks of ownership appear upon the polished surfaces. The piano was brought to Honolulu by the Bergstrom Music Company, and pending the return of Prince Cupid and wife from their globe-trotting tour will be placed in the care of Prince David Kawanakoa.

Mounted Patrol in Luck.

Beginning with today the pay of the members of the mounted police patrol will be raised from \$75 per month to \$90 per month. This increase has been contemplated for some time but it is only recently that any decided action was taken. The other police are getting only \$50 per month at present but it is thought that their pay, too, will soon be raised.

SOON WILL BE READY

The Largest Sugar Mill On the Islands.
COVERS ACRE OF GROUND

Honolulu Plantation Will Be Able to Produce 200 Tons of Sugar per Day.

THE new mill which the Risdon Iron Works is installing at the Honolulu plantation, Oahu, will be ready to grind cane about February 18, according to the statement of P. Schneider, resident manager of the Risdon company, to an Advertiser reporter yesterday. The mill has gone up with astonishing rapidity, the first work having been commenced on June 20 of last year. The mill covers an area of 42,000 square feet and is one of the largest on the Islands.

There has been considerable improved machinery put in, the installing of which caused somewhat of a delay. The mill will have a capacity of 150 to 200 tons of sugar every twenty-four hours and the machinery has been so arranged that the plant can be doubled in the same building area without displacing any of the present structures. The crushing capacity of the mill consists of a 34 by 78 nine-roller mill, with the crusher driven direct from one man engine. The boiler house is equipped with seven 250-horse power Heine trash-burning boilers fitted with Risdon Automatic feeders, many of which are in use in other plantation mills.

The boiling house has the latest and best machinery known in the sugar manufacturing fields. There are three 11-foot Kilby pans, Lily evaporators, and a crystallizing plant which will be sufficient to take off the crop of 200 tons per day. A novel feature in the construction of the crystallizing plant is the method of driving, clutches being used for this purpose, which does away with the numerous belts which obstruct the passageways and are as a general thing dangerous in an establishment containing so much machinery. The plant has sixteen 42-inch water driven centrifugals, the power for driving which is derived from two Risdon high duty pumping engines, the first of this type to be used in the Hawaiian Islands. The centrifugals are also equipped with automatic conveyors and machines for drying the sugar before bagging.

Steel has been used in the construction of the building throughout. This, as well as the machinery within the structures, was constructed entirely by the Risdon Iron Works.

In connection with the mill will be installed large receiving warehouses fitted with conveyors for stacking and conveying the sugar after being bagged. The company has also installed three pumping plants, all of a capacity of nine, seven and twenty million gallons of water per day. This makes the fifth pumping plant which the Risdon people have installed on the plantation property.

SALE OF BOXES BEGUN.

A general meeting of the Mardi Gras committee was held yesterday morning at the office of Dr. Sloggett, in the Progress block. It was reported that many of the boxes had already been sold. Mrs. Paul Isenberg, Sr., paying \$100 for one. Mrs. E. D. Tenney and Mrs. J. S. Walker have arranged a box and seat plan which was presented to the meeting and accepted with thanks. The arrangement pleased those who saw it.

At a meeting to be held next Wednesday afternoon the carnival colors will be chosen. The names of Mrs. E. W. Jordan and Mrs. Samuel Parker were added to the committee on sale of tickets. A number of prominent business men were added to the list. Tickets to the number of 1,500 are to be offered for sale and from the present outlook every ticket will be sold.

QUARTERS COMPLETED.

U. S. Surveyor Alexander Will Occupy His new Offices Today.

Professor W. D. Alexander, the newly appointed head of the Coast and Geodetic Survey for the district of Hawaii, is fitting up two offices which he has secured from the Territorial Government on the second floor of the building in which the local survey bureau is situated. These rooms will be the permanent quarters of Professor Alexander and they will be ready for occupancy this afternoon.

Professor Alexander has a great deal of the work before him well under supervision already, but he still has a heavy task before him.
