**MAKING FOR PEACE.**

**Important Development of the South African War.**

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—A dispatch to the World from London says: An important development in the direction of peace in South Africa is believed to be impending. General Sir Evelyn Wood, who brought about an arrangement with the Boers after Majuba (the final battle of the Boer war of 1880-81, ending in British defeat) is going out in a special capacity, probably as a commissioner, which will enable him to treat with the Boer generals.

His appointment will be a virtual superseding of Lord Kitchener, who, it is expected, will soon be relieved and become commander-in-chief in India.

The scheme, which it is believed in the best informed circles, is afoot for the ending of the war undoubtedly is due to the influence of the King, who was actuated by the advice of the Kaiser.






