QUESTION PAU.

No Appeals From the Supreme Court.

FEDERAL MATTERS ARE EXCEPTED

Correspondence of Justice Frear and Revision Committee Chairman.

A QUESTION has been raised as to whether the decisions of the Supreme Court of the Territory of Hawaii are final in all cases in which no Federal question is involved, or whether such cases may be taken on appeal to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in California, or to the Supreme Court of the United States.

The Supreme Court of the Territory of Hawaii has decided that no appeals lie in such cases, and that only cases in which Federal questions are involved can be taken by writ of error to the Supreme Court of the United States. In other words, that the Territorial courts of Hawaii are on the same footing as the courts of the several States, and not on that of the courts of other Territories.

The commission to revise and codify the criminal and penal laws of the United States appears to have come to the same conclusion, but thought that it was through an oversight. The following correspondence between Chief Justice Frear, of the Hawaiian Supreme Court, and Chairman Bowen, of the Revision Commission, shows that they now consider this to have been the intention of Congress. Mr. Frear's letter, dated February 1, directed to Attorney General Griggs, was as follows:

"The commission to revise and codify the criminal and penal laws of the United States, in their report set forth in your report to Congress for the year 1900, at page 402, quote certain provisions of the Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii, and express a belief that an omission was unintentionally made of any provision for appeals from the United States District Court for Hawaii to the Supreme Court of the United States, and in this I think they are entirely correct.

"But they further say, 'Neither is it certain that the language of the sentence last quoted confers any right of appeal from the Supreme Court of Hawaii to the Circuit Court of Appeals, or to the Supreme Court of the United States, and the act contains no other provision on the subject; yet it is scarcely to be presumed that Congress meant to deny to that Territory a right that is enjoyed by all others.' In this I respectfully suggest, whether they were not under a misapprehension, I believe the intention was that cases in which Federal questions are involved might be taken to the Supreme Court of the United States by writ of error, as from the highest courts of the several States, but that all cases of a local nature should be finally settled here. And it seems to me that the language of the Act is capable of such construction. To have the latter class of cases finally decided here is deemed a privilege, and not the denial of a right as represented in the report of the commission above referred to. When the Hawaiian Commission was in session in Honolulu, such was the expressed desire of the bar and the business community. In the report of the Hawaiian Commission, at page 182, is found this language by the subcommittee on judiciary: 'By making the relations between the Territorial courts of Hawaii and the Federal courts, as to appeals, removal of causes, etc., the same as the corresponding relations between the State and Federal courts, all cases of a local nature can be tried and determined finally in the Islands, and thus the expense and delay of bringing such cases to the mainland, and possibly to Washington, a distance of 5,000 miles, will be avoided.' This was quoted by Mr. Knox, chairman of the House Committee on Territories, in his report upon the Hawaiian bill to the House, on page 20. I inclose a copy of a recent decision by our Supreme Court upon this subject. Very respectfully,

The foregoing letter was referred by the Attorney General to the commission, the chairman of which wrote the following reply, which was received yesterday:

"The commission to revise and codify the criminal and penal laws of the United States— 'WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14, 1901.—Hon. W. F. Frear, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Honolulu, Hawaii. Sir—Yours of the 1st instant to the Honorable Attorney General, has reached us by reference. Hawaii having been expressly made a Territory, we assumed that it was the purpose of Congress to conform its judicial establishment to that of the other Territories. We had not, however, consulted the report of the Hawaiian Commission from which you quote. In the light of that report, and of the considerations presented in your letter and in the decision enclosed, we concur with you that the decisions of the Supreme Court of the Territory should be final, except in cases involving Federal questions.

"We regard it as a subject of regret that Congress shows no disposition at this session to make provision for appeals from the United States District Court of Hawaii to the Supreme Court of the United States; but the pressure of other matters presumably accounts for the failure. Very respectfully yours, ALEX. C. BOTKIN, 'Chairman.'

HEAVY DEMAND FOR GOLD COINS.

An unprecedented demand has been made recently on the treasury at Washington for bright new gold pieces. The chief call has been for the quarter eagles, and it is estimated by the officials that \$50,000 in this form has been shipped to different sub-treasuries, where the demand of previous years has been for only a few hundred dollars. There have been many calls also for half eagles and eagles. There are demands from time to time for gold dollars, but these cannot be met freely under existing law. Their coinage was suspended ten years ago, and only a few are held by the treasury, dating back to that time as souvenirs. These are never issued otherwise than one at a time, and their issue is surrounded with a good deal of red tape. The \$2.50 piece is now the smallest gold coin issued, and upon this seems to have concentrated the chief demand for modest Christmas gifts in the form of money.

A LOST ROOM FOUND.

Congressman Roberts, in connection with his work as a committeeman, recently discovered a forgotten room in the capitol, back of statutory hall. It was full of old books and during the Civil War was used as a hospital. An old stove and some cleft wood were found, just as they were left over thirty years ago. A soldier's coat, full of dust and moth-eaten, hung on the gas jet. The air was stifling and the lock on the door had almost rusted off.
