The Play

FLORENCE ROBERTS entertained Honolulu very delightfully last night in the Adventures of Nell Gwynne. As the rollicking, fascinating heroine of the playhouse, she carried the role through five acts with a dash that won all hearts.

If she gives us as good as she did last night we will not be disappointed during the run of her engagement. The opera house was crowded to the doors and the audience was perhaps more enthusiastic than has been an opera house audience in many months. There was liberal applause and several curtain calls.

Certainly Florence Roberts is astonishing. As different from Sapho, her first night character, as night from day, she astonished me, and I suppose every one else, by her versatility. She had a girlish abandon as Nell Gwynne that was very fetching and which marks her as an actress of rare intuition and ability. She brought out the bright lines of the comedy drama with brilliancy and made the evening seem short indeed.

For the men, one cannot say anything but what is good. Paul Gerson as King Charles was much more pleasing than in Sapho and will do very well. Clarence Montaine as Lord Rochester bore himself cavalierly and Lucius Henderson as Jack Mardyn was up to the mark.

Clarence Arper did nicely as Haynes, the old actor, and Allan Dunn, our local talent, was not buried by any means. Miss Juliet Crosby will be seen in the title role of Madame Butterfly, and if one believes the San Francisco critics, we have a treat in store for us then.




