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The Play

THE Belasco-Thall production of "Camille" at the Opera House last night was unquestionably the best of the repertoire yet given. The cast was fittingly assigned and each of the characters seemed in perfect sympathy with the play.

Queen Liliuokalani attended, occupying a box in company with Prince David, Miss Campbell and Miss Abigail Campbell.

The auditorium was packed to its doors and that the audience was an appreciative one was shown by the cordial applause given the beautiful and talented Miss Roberts at the periods of her splendid acting. The audience was also liberal in its applause with the other members of the cast, Mr. Lucius Henderson, in the role of Armand, receiving hearty demonstrations of appreciation.

Mr. Paul Gerson, as the treacherous Count de Varville, was as villainous as one could desire, and got liberalisses from the gallery.

Miss Howe, as Madame Prudence, has made a careful study of the part, and her interpretation of the garrulous and hungry old milliner could not well be improved upon. Miss Stella Razeto, as Nette, the fiancée of Gustave, made a hit with her clever, and somewhat imprudent speech in imitation of a bombastic lawyer. The satisfied and obedient role of Gustave was well taken by Mr. Frank Readick. Miss Lillian Armsby, as Nette's maid, to Camille, has played the part with Miss Roberts for twelve years, and portrays the devotion and faithfulness of the character perfectly. The character of Monsieur Duval was well portrayed by Clarence Montaine, and in the role of the stern practical father he had an opportunity to exhibit his versatility, comic characters being his forte. Carlyle Moore, as Gaston Rieux, was in sympathy with the part and made an impression of sincerity and devotion.

The two great emotional scenes of the play in the second and third acts were given in such manner as to bring out handkerchiefs stealthily, and the pathetic death of Camille found many undisciplined weepers. The trying scene in the second act where Camille is visited by Armand's father and makes the sacrifice he asks, is the longest emotional scene ever written, lasting for a period of twenty minutes. Miss Roberts made a magnificent interpretation of the part, and her work in the last act, where Camille is friendless, deserted, poverty-stricken and alone except for her devoted maid and the faithful Gaston, leaves no room for improvement. In the finale, when Armand returns having learned of her sacrifice and his own mistake, Mr. Montaine and Miss Roberts are both graceful and efficient in the portrayal of the reconciliation and the pathetic death of Camille. The drama is one of the most popular ever produced, and the manner in which it was handled last night lost nothing to its good name.

The gowns worn by Miss Roberts were sumptuous. The one worn in the first act was of cream gauze, with shafts of golden wheat; that worn in the second act, while perhaps not so effective, was more elegant and expensive, being white lace over yellow chiton and gauze, heavily jeweled, and spangled with jet disks. The gown worn in the scene in the country was a beautiful Duchess creation of pink chiton and lace, and the magnificent black ball gown was entirely of jet. Miss Roberts' entire wardrobe is from the hands of Worth and Herman and bears the unmistakable stamp of Paris.

In an interview last night Miss Roberts spoke of her pleasure in the liberal and appreciative audiences, but had a little word of chiding for the "Mephists" in the back of the house. This has been quite noticeable and the pleasure of others should be considered by the careless ones who are responsible for the annoyance.

Mr. Lewis Morrison, who joined the company from the Sierra, expresses himself as delighted with Honolulu, the tropical beauties of the Islands far exceeding his expectations. He has much to say of the surprising school systems of the City and its modern equipment in all respects. Especially is he pleased with the audience.

"From New York and all the larger cities down to the little towns," said he, "I have never found better observance of theater dress. While it is the usual thing to find about one-third of an audience in full dress, it is very unusual to find an audience in evening dress almost to its entirety, as with Honolulu audiences. I shall indeed be pleased to present a Honolulu audience with 'Mephists'—the requests are coming in from all directions for a speedy production of 'Faust'."

"Richeieu" and "Merchant of Venice" are also plays in which Mr. Morrison is famous, and these will all be given during the next week. The electrical apparatus, firebugs, electric owls, dancing jms, skeletons, etc., which have made the inferno of "Faust" so splendidly spectacular in Honolulu all in Honolulu arrived with Mr. Morrison, and "Faust" will undoubtedly be an excellent production.
