A NEEDED PLANT.

Shall City Get Police and Fire Alarm?

VALUE OF THE ALARM DEVICES

Legislature Asked to Add to the Safeguards of the Town From Crime.

If the Legislature of Hawaii makes the appropriation asked for by High Sheriff Brown and recommended by Attorney General Dole, the police and fire alarm system now being installed in this city by A. J. Coffee for the Gamewell Alarm System Company of New York city, will be one of the metropolitan improvements which will become identified with the new Honolulu. Mr. Coffee yesterday installed a receiving board and indicator in the police station and on Monday will give an exhibition of the system to the members of the Government, the legislators and any others who are interested in giving the city adequate police and fire protection. The system represented by Mr. Coffee is one of the best known in the United States and probably the most successful. He is on his way to Manila to install the system and, learning that Honolulu desired automatic fire and police signals, brought with him duplicate sets of instruments. High Sheriff Brown stated yesterday afternoon that he asked for an appropriation for such a system two years ago but did not get it. This time he asks for \$10,000 and trusts the legislators will see their way clear to grant the request. He says the city can be much better protected by the installation of such a system, and for illustration states that in the event of a policeman making an arrest in the suburbs after every one has retired, and telephones cannot be had, he must perforate his prisoner along the roads until he can get into communication with the police station and summon the patrol wagon. Under the system now being installed for exhibition purposes the officer will have an automatic police box on his beat. By inserting his key in the same a signal is turned into the station house and the patrol wagon is summoned at once, either quickly or slowly, as the officer desires. If he wishes to telephone particulars to the clerk on watch at the receiver board the instrument is before him. Keys to the box will be distributed to citizens in the neighborhood. Such keys when

put into the box remain fastened until released by an officer.

The receiving board was put in one of the upstairs dormitories yesterday. It is a handsome affair, provided with sets of dials, automatic signals, electric buttons, glistening brasses, tape holders, telephone devices, etc., that bewilder the native police officers. It is as large as a club sideboard, handsomely finished, much of the wood work being carved.

In the patrol wagon stable is an indicator with a gong. When a box number comes into the receiver board dial, the same number appears in large disc figures on the indicator, the ropes attached to the bits of the horses are automatically released and by the time the men are in their seats they are in full knowledge of where they are to go and what they are to do, and if others are to accompany them on the trip.

Twenty-five boxes are to be provided for, which will be scattered along the beats of the officers, but are intended to be placed strictly in the neighborhoods where brawls are more frequent. One of these boxes will be placed upon a telephone pole on Bethel street today and on Monday the exhibition will be given showing in detail what can be expected of the instrument if it were three and four miles away from the station house.

The same plan is being followed at the central fire station and an exhibition will be given with this system as well. The fire boxes are more simple than the police boxes, as only one signal is necessary to be turned in—"Fire!"

The police boxes are painted blue and the fire boxes red. Each police officer has a key which will fit both boxes. At regular intervals while he is on his beat he will be required to turn in a signal and a record is made of that fact at the station house. If an officer snoozes on his beat he will be able to do so only between the lapses of time from one half hour to another.

It is estimated that \$10,000 is hardly sufficient to install a complete system of police boxes, but it will be a long-desired start to the desired end. High Sheriff Brown states that one police box is as valuable as twenty police officers and the protection to the city cannot be overestimated.


