THE CITY OF PEKING ARRIVES

Shortly before 11 o'clock last night the Pacific Mail steamer City of Peking was sighted off Koko Head and very soon afterwards was at anchor off the harbor. She sailed from San Francisco at 1 o'clock in the afternoon of the 25th of last month and brought one day's later news than came by the transport Hancock.

The Advertiser's representative went out to the City of Peking in the Young brothers' gasoline launch, learning the latest news of the outside world. The speedy launch left the boat landing at 11:30, arrived alongside of the mail steamer at 11:50, left the steamer's side at 12:10 and arrived again at the landing at 12:30. There are many families of immigrating negroes aboard the Peking and they are a happy crowd. There was a wedding among them during the voyage. The ceremony and the happiness of the loving couple were magnificently topped off by a dream of a cake, a wedding cake, the manufacture of which was superintended by that most famous of ocean stewards, Johnson, of the Peking. When the dusky bride and groom set eyes on Johnson's masterpiece they so far forgot the dignity of the solemn occasion as to do a cake walk on the promenade deck.

The Peking will come into the harbor immediately after daylight this morning. She will sail for the Orient, probably about 5 o'clock this afternoon. She has 200 tons of freight for this port.

Blams for Rio Wreck
SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—The Inspectors of Steam Vessels have rendered a decision in the case of the steamer Rio de Janeiro. The license of Chief Engineer Herlihy is revoked. They find Captain Ward to blame for leaving his anchorage that morning. His license would probably have been had he lived. Pilot Jordan is also blamed for bringing the vessel in while such a thick fog existed. He is out of the jurisdiction of the inspectors, however. The State Board of Pilot Commissioners now have Jordan's case under consideration. The findings review the testimony of the many witnesses as bearing on the wreck, the condition of the vessel at her last inspection on April 28, 1900, the lives lost and saved, set her value at \$500,000, and of her cargo \$400,000. The inspectors then go over Chief Engineer P. H. Herlihy's testimony and call attention to the various instances in which he disobeyed the orders of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, and the unwritten law of the engine-room.
