HERD OF HONOLULU ELKS ROUNDED UP LAST NIGHT

ANTLERS grew like weeds during the installation of the officers of the brand new Lodge, No. 616, of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks at Progress Hall last night. A wild herd of 100 new Elks donned the antlers, the ceremony being performed by Grand Exalted Ruler Jerome B. Fisher of Jamestown, N. Y., assisted by District Deputy Kennedy of Los Angeles. It is the first lodge installed by the Grand Exalted Ruler this year. Dr. Charles B. Cooper was installed as the Exalted Ruler of the local herd amid the applause of the wild ones who swore allegiance to their leader in the impressive ritual of the order. The other officers installed were as follows: Esteemed Leading Knight, A. E. Murphy; Esteemed Loyal Knight, Judge Gear; Esteemed Lecturing Knight, J. H. Fisher; Secretary, Albert F. Judd; Treasurer, W. G. Ashley; Tiler, A. R. Cunha. The trustees elected were Brothers Church, Wilder and Wall. From 8 o'clock last evening until a late hour this morning the Elks grazed and drank of the pure mountain waters of the ranges. As the night wore on the Elks capered and performed antics which amused the onlookers, especially during the initiation ceremonies. The Grand Exalted Ruler was a trick Elk and the fun never lagged while he

held the gavel and pounded the table for "Order, Order, Brothers, I must have order!" At midnight the officers elected were taken to the ante-room and were afterwards conducted, one by one, before the Grand Exalted Ruler to be installed into their respective offices, while the rest of the herd stood and sang "America." FRANK S. FOR LOCAL OWNER

Octoroon's Leg Blistered--Jas. McAuliffe Succeeds Matt Earley.

The little colony of horsemen who make their home at the race track during the summer months was under a cloud yesterday occasioned by the sudden taking from its midst of Matt Earley, trainer of the Prince David-Sam Parker stable. Matt did his work on Vloris and Weller on Saturday morning as usual and none of his associates noticed anything amiss with him. About 9 o'clock he was reported to be very sick in his lodgings. Billy Cunningham, who was at the track, went over to see him and says that Earley did not recognize him when he spoke to him. "Don't you know me?" asked Cunningham. "I can't see you," answered Matt. "I seem to be blind, but I feel all right."

Cunningham sent for a doctor but before he arrived Earley was dead. The cause of his death is said to have been disease. He was buried at Pearl City on Sunday afternoon, a few of the boys from the track going down to pay their last respects. Matt Earley was born in Atlanta, Georgia, and was about 35 years of age. He had worked around horses all his life. Ten years ago in New York he was widely known as the trainer of several celebrated runners which won some of the big Eastern stakes, including the Metropolitan and City, and Suburban. Two years ago he became trainer for Prince David, whose stable, which included Weller, Vloris, Sir Castor and Cormorant, was racing in the States. With three of these horses he came to Hawaii, arriving here about this time last year.

His connection with the popular red and white colors has been signally successful and his charges always went to the post as fit as could be. Earley's best race down here was that for the Rosita Challenge Cup, run last June and won by Vloris, conditioned by him, in track record time. Weller last year a cripple was nursed and put on his feet by Matt, and twice defeated the hitherto invincible Billy McCluskey, at Hilo last January. The deceased man was well liked by his fellow workers at the track. He was a genial, good-natured fellow, and his cheery presence will be greatly missed. He often used to sing a song the refrain of which was, "Get Your Money's Worth." Poor Matt, he got his money's worth, anyway.

Tom Hollinger's new jockey's name is Ross. The lad has done considerable exercising at the Coast. Aggravation is doing nice work for her race with Virgie A on Saturday and will run a great mare. Many who saw her last race are of the opinion that she was stale and that she ran her race in a work-out on the day previous to the match race. There will be no mistake made along these lines this time. George Thomas would have ridden Aggravation next Saturday but for Ross' arrival last Saturday. Virgie A is being given judicious work and will be right on edge when the flag falls on Saturday. On Sunday she negotiated six furlongs in 1:25. Nichols will ride her and her connections are confident of confirming the verdict given in the last encounter. Lieut. Hancock and Al. Moore have, it is reported, purchased the black sprinter Frank S from A. B. Loebenstein of Hilo for \$300, and will add him to their string. Beside Virgie A there is in this stable a speedy bay trotting mare of Hambletonian stock, which will be

trained. Westwood and Sec. Nichols will handle the horses this season.

Harry Fears, who rode for Prince David last season and who came from the States a year ago with Matt Earley, will return to his home in Little Rock, Arkansas, shortly. Harry says that he has had a great sufficiency of "race horse in" and will henceforward help his aged parents to raise garden truck.

On Sunday afternoon at the track Acrobat, driven by W. H. Smith, and Lustre, piloted by Charlie Bellina, chased each other for half a mile. The brush was to buggies and Lustre won in 1:13. Every Sunday afternoon a bunch of roadsters do funny things on the circuit but so far no lives have been lost.

Octoroon, which is suffering from a strained tendon in her right fore leg, had the injured member blistered yesterday. Her owner hopes to have his black pet on the track in a couple of weeks.

Yesterday Arnie W worked a heat in 2:33, last half 1:12. Albert M in the same stable was sent a mile in 2:33. James McAuliffe will train for Prince David this season. He will also have Gartalene, which mare should arrive here from the Coast in three weeks. Jimmy is a capable boy and his employers should have no cause to grumble when the season's results come to be reviewed.

C. H. Judd has now five horses in his stable--Violin, Star, Irish Lassie, Faro Bank and Wayboy. Violin is doing well and looks like being as good as ever this year. Irish Lassie is lame and has not been worked for two weeks. Wayboy, which is looked upon as a broad-winner, is working along satisfactorily. He put in two heats yesterday in 2:37 1/2 and 2:38, respectively.

The only McManus is now quartered at the track. He has McKenzie's Tom Ryder and his own Ayres P. Tom Ryder is looking wonderfully well and has more fat on him than ever before. Proneness to run to lean has always been the trouble with him. The veteran Ayres P also looks slick and well and is said to have shed most of his soreness. Mac says that the Fourth of July meeting in Hilo will sure be a whooper. G. S. McKenzie, manager of the Honolulu Park track, will race no horses of his own, as he considers such a policy to be detrimental to the best interests of sport.

McManus has received Pedro, a bay pacer gelding to train, and expects to receive other additions to his string.

W. M. Cunningham's Lorraine C is at the track doing gentle work and may race this season. At present she is acting as running mate to Waldo J. Lorraine C is by the unbeaten El Rio Rev. Allegro, also owned by Cunningham, will not be raced this year.

Watossa will, it is expected, be matched against the winner of next Saturday's race. Aleck Harris, the track expert, has received three horses to train. They were shipped from Kauai by Charles Rice and consigned to Tom King. Dickey Davis will drive two of them in their engagements. The lot consists of: Monzoose, bay horse, 3 years old, pacer. Harry B, bay horse, 5 years old, trotter.

Albert, bay horse, runner. Harry B is by Hollywood, an Island horse, out of Hattie B, a half-sister to Yolo Maid. Albert has won races on Kauai and was bred by "Kukalan" Horner.

Aleck Harris is a past master in the art of training and a few years ago developed Judah (2:28 1/2) and Fred, Mac (2:42 1/2), the former a pacer and the latter a trotter. Both of the marks obtained by these horses are Island-bred records and stand today.

George Graham, formerly trainer for Green Morris and later on for himself, in handling John D, the dark pacer, for Billy Cunningham. John D has a ring-bone or would be a crackerjack, from all appearances.

Opinio is training Indra for Cunningham. Harry Pigott having left the employ of the Vela ka Hao stable. Tom Ryder is said to have worked a

half mile in 1:37 on the Hilo track and Ayres P to have gone the mile in 2:22. W. H. Cornwell has leased Venus to Dickey Davis for the racing season. Several speedy horses, including a hot maiden runner and a crack pacer, are supposed to be on the way to Hilo from San Francisco.

It may not be generally known that Croole (2:15) has a mare named Javella in the States with a mark of 2:06 1/2.
