# DULL DAY IN COURT

## Capt. Sodergren's Case in Federal Court.

### WRIGHT WILL HAS BEEN FILED

#### Usual Round of Routine Work In First Circuit Court Yesterday.

The case of the United States vs. Captain Sodergren, charged with assault and battery on the high seas, came up yesterday before the Federal Court. Deputy United States District Attorney Dunne for the prosecution and Attorney Kinney for the defense. The testimony of several witnesses was taken and the case continued until this morning.

The jurors were as follows: O. G. Traphagen, E. R. Adams, J. K. Merseberg, A. B. Scrimgeour, W. F. Sharratt, E. C. Winston, E. C. Rowe, W. L. Eton, St. C. B. Sayres, Ed. Henriques, Chas. Carter and J. H. Stelling.

Michael Swan, the negro who was arrested by United States Deputy Marshal Hendree on the schooner Admiral, will plead this morning before Judge Estee.

The continued case of Mist vs. Kaplani estate, occupied all yesterday afternoon in the First Circuit Court, Magoon & Thompson and Hatch & Silliman appearing for the plaintiff and J. T. De Bolt and Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for the defendant.

#### COURT NOTES.

Return of summons was yesterday made in the case of Thos. Metcalf vs. Antonio J. Lopez, showing service upon the defendant by Albert McGurn, deputy sheriff.

Levi L. Joseph, formerly a messenger in the Judiciary Department and now a messenger in the Attorney General's office, yesterday made application for admission and license to practice law in the inferior courts of the Territory. The application is endorsed by Henry Smith. The petition was heard by the Court at 4 p. m. and the applicant was duly admitted and licensed to practice.

William O. Smith has petitioned the court that letters testamentary may be issued to himself and Anna S. Wright and William H. Wright, the legatees and devisees under the will of John N. Wright. The petition states that the deceased left estate consisting of 1,850 shares of the capital stock of Ookala Sugar Plantation Company of the value of \$37,000.

Thomas Fitch has been appointed by the First Judge of the First Circuit Court as guardian ad litem for H. A. F. Carter and Grace S. Carter in the case of J. O. Carter vs. Sybil A. Carter et al. a bill in equity praying for instructions.

#### PROBATE.

Meta H. Sutherland, executrix under the will of Maria A. Bruns, has filed her inventory of the property of the estate, showing an estimated value of \$6,500 in real estate and \$14,250 in personal property.

Miss Jessie Roesch has petitioned the Court for the appointment of Wilson K. Azbill as administrator of the estate of her father, Charles Roesch, deceased. Formerly the petitioner prayed for appointment of Mr. Azbill as temporary administrator; she now asks that the appointment be permanent. The Court appointed Friday, June 7, at 10 o'clock a. m. as the time for the hearing of the petition.

Tra. Eskow, administrator of the estate of Donald G. Campbell, alias James Osborne, deceased, yesterday filed a petition, praying for permission of the Court to sell certain real estate belonging to said estate, of the estimated value of \$750, for the purpose of paying the debts of said estate, there being no cash funds in the hands of said administrator with which to discharge said debts.

An order to show cause why such sale should not be made was issued by the Court.

#### HARRISON VS. MAGOON CASE.

In accordance with the decision of the Supreme Court filed in the case of Thomas M. Harrison vs. J. A. Magoon et al., the clerk of the court yesterday issued a remittitur, remanding said case to the First Court for the further proceedings directed in the opinion filed with the decision.

### EXPLORER KILLED BY POISONED ARROW.

It is with deep regret that we record the death which occurred in Nigeria on Nov. 27 last year from a wound by a poisoned arrow, of the Hon. David Carnegie, youngest son of the Earl of Southesk, one of the most promising and successful of the younger generation of British pioneers in new lands. Although not yet 30 years old at the time of his death, Mr. Carnegie had made his mark as both a capable organizer and leader, having, during the course of his work in Nigeria, been singularly successful in gaining the love and respect of those under him, his influence over whom is described as almost magical.

A native chief had been raiding on the bank of the Niger, some twenty-five miles from Lokoja, whence Mr. Carnegie was despatched with a small force to quell the disturbance. The refractory chief had fled, but complaints having been made of the conduct of the King of Tawall, Mr. Carnegie resolved to proceed thither and arrest him. The place was found deserted, and the return march was begun, but the small party was at once attacked by concealed natives, the leader being hit by an arrow on the thigh. Fifteen minutes later he was dead, but his body was gallantly rescued and brought to Lokoja by his devoted followers. By his death a most promising career has been cut short.—London Geographical Journal.
