A Well-Known Newspaperman and Miner on Nippon Maru.

One of the most prominent passengers on the steamer Nippon Maru, which arrived from San Francisco yesterday evening and sails for the Orient this afternoon, is Leigh Hunt, of Seattle, who is on his way to Korea to look after his large gold mining interests in that part of the world.

Mr. Hunt is well known in this city, having visited here many times in the course of his travels. It will be remembered that he at one time was the owner of the Post-Intelligencer, which he lost during the great financial panic.

It was then that he went to Korea and became identified with mining interests. He became rich, and later returned to the coast, where he bought another newspaper in Seattle.

Mr. Hunt is at present very sick aboard the Nippon Maru, and can be seen by no one. He is accompanied by his family.


