TRANSPORT FROM SAN FRANCISCO

Before sunrise yesterday morning the United States army transport Lawton was off this port. Shortly after daylight she was alongside navy wharf No. 1.

The Lawton sailed from San Francisco on the 25th of May, Saturday, about noon, and experienced a pleasant passage to port. Among her passengers for Honolulu was Representative F. W. Beckley.

The transport brought four days' later newspaper files and mail, there being 143 sacks of mail matter for this city. She will coal here, and then proceed to Manila via Guam, sailing to-morrow, probably.
