FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

Will Be Examined
By Civil Service
Code.

COMMISSIONERS
FROM WASHINGTON

The Employees Appointed Here
Prior to June 14, 1900,
Are Not Affected.

William A. Rodenberg, president of the United States Civil Service Commission, and Chief Examiner Serven, who arrived on the Peking, from Washington, D. C., as stated in yesterday's Advertiser, to establish civil service in the Hawaiian Islands, will begin their work in a very short time. Their work is important in that a large number of clerks and employes in the postoffice, customs and internal revenue departments, will have to undergo examinations to fill the positions which they already occupy.

When asked whether the employes of departments now under federal jurisdiction who had held their positions prior to June 14, 1900, would have to take the examinations, Mr. Rodenberg replied that they would not. This is one of the questions which customs house employes and guards, together with the old postoffice employes have been asking of federal officials for some time past, but to which they never received a satisfactory reply. Commissioner Rodenberg's statement settles the matter once and for all. The examinations will have to be taken by all clerks and employes appointed at any time since this day last year, when the Republic of Hawaii became the Territory of Hawaii.

In the apportionment of departmental work, which consists of appointments to various departments in Washington, D. C., Mr. Rodenberg stated that Hawaii was entitled to fifteen positions in the Government Printing Office at Washington. "This will afford an excellent opportunity for some of your ambitious young men engaged in that class of trade to take these examinations and stand a chance for appointment to Washington," said the commissioner. "There they will have ample opportunities to study the American government from a practical standpoint. Application blanks for these positions, as well as in all other branches which come under our jurisdiction, will be available at the postoffice in a few days. An examining board will be located in this city, and two others on other islands, possibly Maui and Hawaii."

Both gentlemen are delighted with Hawaii, it being their first visit to the Islands. Even the sultry weather of yesterday did not deprive them of the pleasure of taking in some of the sights of the city. In the morning they visited the Circuit Courts. For the present they are domiciled at the Hawaiian Hotel. Mr. Rodenberg announced that J. W. Irwin, superintendent of the free delivery system, with headquarters at San Francisco, will be here in July to establish the clerk-carrier department. Mr. Rodenberg asked in this connection whether the houses were all numbered as yet. This, he stated, was a prerequisite to the establishment of such a service.

KAHUNAS PRAYING AGAINST DOLE

They Want Him to be Permanently Incapacitated—Another Victim.

Few people who have not lived here a long time know the extent to which the kahuna superstition of "praying people to death" or to disease prevails among the Hawaiians. Just at present there is general excitement among the natives over the report that the kahunas are at work upon Governor Dole and that the latter's illness is attributable to their prayers. Hawaiians believe implicitly in their necromancy, and even some of the men in the Legislature say that Governor Dole, now that the kahunas are after him, is assuredly doomed to at least a state of permanent incapacity. It was the first plan to pray the Governor to death, but this was changed when the task seemed too formidable, and the kahunas went in for an incurable disease. A kahuna said yesterday that L. A. Thurston would be the next victim. The magicians want him to become paralyzed in the left leg, and those among them with special facilities of eyesight say the leg is beginning to drag already.

John Young was the first white man in Hawaii upon whom the kahunas plied their arts—but they never did it but once. On a fine morning a witch-doctor set up an altar and began praying for the death of Young, whereupon the latter put up an altar of his own and began praying for the death of the kahuna. The magician was so scared that he succumbed in three days.

Norrie's Rules Popular.
This is a curious town. Yesterday morning when the Advertiser printed Norrie's "health rules," the opening chapter of which described a walk and a gin fizz, there was a run on the local bars for gin fizzes which has not been equalled in the recent history of the trade. Cunha reports an extraordinary demand. The combination of sauerbrunnen and white wine which Norrie said his health required at lunch time seemed to excite the thirst of the convivial set, and at the Grill twelve separate parties were served with that unusual mixture at noon. Evidently Norrie's rules will set the pace that kills all over town.
