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



### SUFFERED FOR DEVIL'S ISLAND CAPTIVE

Havre. Hardly had the steamer got outside the harbor of New York than the young Frenchman was placed in irons, and thus reached Havre. The American colony at Havre interested themselves in Sabate's behalf on account of his service in the American army, and he was released and allowed to depart from his native shores—forever.

In July, 1899, he enlisted in the Twenty-seventh United States Infantry, and was on recruiting duty in New York for some time. When the regiment was ordered to the Philippines he accompanied it as far as San Francisco. While there a telegram came from the War Department at Washington, in which the commanding officer of the regiment was ordered to discharge the young Frenchman without honor. This was the day before the regiment sailed for Manila. Astounded and seemingly disgraced, Sabate set about to discover why he had been thus summarily dismissed from the ranks. He learned that it was through secret French influences that the French Ambassador had been requested to ask for his dismissal, and the request was granted. Later he was allowed discharge papers on which appeared "honorably discharged."

Then the exile began life anew. His was a precarious existence. He finally decided to become a sailor, and went to the Bering Sea last year on a cruise. Finally he engaged as a sailor aboard the Benicia and has made two trips in that vessel. Even as a sailor the evil genius of his misfortune seems to be following him closely, for yesterday morning he and a man named Baugh, the agent of the Pacific Sailors' Union, had an altercation resulting in Sabate's causing Baugh to be arrested on a warrant. Sabate says that Baugh came on board the Benicia and told him that if he did not give up \$5 and be shipped by the Union, they would make it hot for him. Sabate replied that he was an American citizen and could ship how and with whom he pleased. He said he had shipped on the Benicia through the Shipowners' Association, and he proposed to stay with them. Baugh is said to have made some insulting remarks, and to have placed his fist on Sabate's nose, but not striking him. Several sailors were close by and witnessed the attempt on the part of Baugh to extort money from Sabate.

In the afternoon several sailors of the Union crowd attempted to bully Sabate while he and a friend were standing at the corner of Nuuanu and Queen streets. Two of them made threats to "do him up," and told him to get off the sidewalk. Both used insulting language, and but for the interference of a Honolulu man who ordered the men to go about their own business, Sabate might have been mobbed. The appearance of a police officer on the scene shortly afterward caused the bullies to slink away and get out of sight. The case against Baugh will be tried this morning in the police court.

A magazine at the Mare Island, California, Navy Yard, containing about twenty tons of smokeless powder, became ignited on June 5 by chemical action. The powder did not explode, but generated enough gas and smoke to force the top off the magazine. The powder was slowly consumed. The structure cost several hundred thousand dollars.
