There will be a business meeting of the Central Union Christian Endeavor Society at Miss Yarrow's residence, corner Pihoko and Beretania streets, this evening at 7:30 o'clock. Francis M. Brooks, the attorney, and Miss Ada May Gertz, one of the younger of the school teachers of Honolulu, were quietly married yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at Waiialua. They returned to the city yesterday evening, and for the present will remain at the Hawaiian Hotel. According to the plans prepared, a heavy celebration of the Fourth was indulged in at Kamaio, Moikakai, yesterday. In the forenoon there were to be horse races, at noon a big luau attended by all the residents from far and near, and dancing in the afternoon and evening. **AGAINST RECIPROACITY.**

Senator Aldrich Starts a Campaign Aimed at Cuba. Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island, chairman of the Committee on Finance and the recognized leader on the Republican side in all tariff and revenue matters, slipped into Washington and back again yesterday. During his brief stay he saw other Republican Senators and some officials of the Government and discussed an important subject. Senator Aldrich has started a campaign against reciprocity, aimed primarily at Cuba, but to take cognizance of other reciprocal commercial arrangements now pending. It is understood that the Senator sent a "strong appeal" to the President against considering reciprocity propositions favorably, and earnestly urged him to proceed with great caution in that direction. It is also understood that the interested Senator Aldrich is advocating the manufacturers who are now doing business under high tariff, propose immediately to work up sentiment against reciprocity and begin a propaganda similar to the movement now in operation in favor of reciprocity. It is said that the favorable sentiment has been worked up largely by the manufacturers of agricultural machinery and implements, who would be the greatest gainers, it is claimed, under reciprocity.—Washington Star.

**About Lucien Young.**

Captain Lucien Young, captain of the port of Havana, has sentenced Secundino Coral de Garcia and Julio Urquiza, editor and director of El Stedee, to sixty and thirty days respectively in Alcazar prison, for a libelous article in which it was said that Young when he sent to General Wood a copy of the paper purporting to contain the agreement with the sievedores, reached in the recent strike. Young has a harbor court and authority for his actions. The sievedores are greatly incensed and threaten to make trouble.—Havana Exchange.




