



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

**REGATTA DAY IS COMING**

Will Surpass Anything of the Kind in Former Years.

Already plans are being made for Regatta Day, Honolulu's annual feast of aquatic sports. A committee composed of three members, the Healanis, the Myrtle and the Lelani Boat Clubs each being represented, has the matter in charge and a holiday is promised which will in every way surpass those of former years.

Of course it all depends on the amount of money raised for the purpose by the committee, and all arrangements cannot be made until it is known what the resources will be. Members of the boat clubs are, as usual, prepared to do everything in

their power to make Regatta Day a tremendous success, and it is safe to say that all that can be done in the interests of aquatic sports will be accomplished by the yachtsmen and boatmen of Honolulu.

Arthur Wilder, the chairman of the Regatta Day committee, was seen yesterday by a reporter concerning the events of the third Saturday in September. "Of course nothing definite will be arranged by the committee until it knows what the financial resources are," said Mr. Wilder. "Last year we had a very successful Regatta Day; we had plenty of money and the holiday was a greater success than any previous one. There is no reason that I can see why we should not be as successful this year in the matter of finances, and I think there is every indication of this year's regatta eclipsing anything of the kind that has been witnessed here before."

"It is a little early yet for exact plans to be made. It will probably be the 1st of September before the committee has arranged for all the events. There will be no shell races on Regatta Day. Something new and inter-

esting will be a two-oared race for about a half-mile in the new boats recently brought out from Germany. There are two boats just alike; the Healanis have one, the other belonging to the Myrtles.

"The yacht races will, of course, be the chief events of the day. The yachts will be divided into four classes. Then there will be stationary-seat boat races, barge races, canoe races, whaleboat races, swimming and diving, as well as other events not yet arranged.

"There is a chance of Lahaina sending a boat and crew here to compete in the whaleboat races."

There is some talk of establishing a boat club at Pearl Harbor, although nothing more than the mere suggestion has been made as yet.

That it is an ideal place for the headquarters of an association devoted to yachting and boating is beyond question. There are enthusiasts in town who say that it will not be very long before Pearl Harbor will be the place where all the boat clubs will locate their houses.

**POLICE TO AGAIN MEET THE STARS**

They Will Try and Redeem Their Defeat of Last Week.

The Police and the Honolulu Athletic nines will battle for supremacy on the Makiki baseball diamond this afternoon. This will be the second game which the Police have entered this season, and they are confident of redeeming their defeat of last week at the hands of the Stars.

A few changes have been made in the personnel of the Police team and the weak spots made strong. They have been practicing during the week whenever it was possible for them to get away from their duties in the department.

ers; Akau, first base; Chillingworth, second base; Duncan, third base; H. Mossman, short stop; A. Mossman, left field; Joy and Parker, center field; Lars, right field.

The "billy-wielders" are intending to spring a sensation on the field, by introducing a kahuna on the field, who is expected to charm away all chance of the Honolulu Athletics from securing the victory under any circumstances. The kahuna is expected to practice his arts in the open. A large crowd is expected, and the members of the Star team have signified their intention to be present to act as jollifiers.
