**INTERESTING WITNESS**  
**Was Born Before Coming of the Missionaries.**  
**PRINCE DAVID IN A NEW ROLE**  
**Petty Trial Jury Drawn—Waimea Hotel Company Files Answer.**

There was a very interesting witness on the stand yesterday testifying in behalf of the prosecution in the case of Kapiolani Estate vs. the Kaneohe Ranch Company. The witness is an old lady named Mary Maikai. How old she is she is not certain, but on the witness stand she said she was a big girl when the missionaries came to the Islands and distinctly remembers their arrival. For many years she was a pupil of Alexander Johnson. Later she entered the employ of a missionary family and went to China with them, where she remained eight years. This did not end her wanderings, however. When she came back, one one occasion, while going from Oahu to Molokai, a storm arose, driving her and the boat far out to sea. A whaling vessel picked them up and took them around the Horn to New York, where the woman remained for a year and a half. When the gold fever broke out in California she moved westward with the great throng of emigrants, and in 1849 arrived in San Francisco, where she was soon taken on board a vessel coming to Honolulu, in which city she has resided ever since.

The testimony of Mary was taken in order that the validity of certain patents transferring land from one Apumomona to the Kapiolani Estate might be established. Attorney Silliman claimed that the old woman's testimony was worthless, as the proof rested upon the documents and not on her word. Mary has an excellent command of English and expressed herself fluently in that tongue. Often she dispensed with the assistance of the court interpreter in her haste to answer the queries of the lawyers.

**PRINCE DAVID HELPS.**  
 Yesterday the defense in the case of Kapiolani Estate vs. the Kaneohe Ranch introduced in evidence a hundred or more musty old volumes containing land transfers now long forgotten. By the time the last one had been deposited before Judge Gear, his honor looked like a second-hand book dealer. It was late when court adjourned, and in order to expedite matters for the clerks and deputies who had toiled perspiringly up the stairs many times, Judge Gear ordered the jury to lend a hand and help them out in carrying them back. Everyone in the court room took the hint, and attorneys, as well, grabbed an armful of dusty ledgers and carried them into the basement. Prince David, who was present, determining not to be outdone, laid hold of the last remaining book and formed the end of the long procession.

**KAPIOLANI ESTATE ITEMS.**  
 The defendant's bill of costs in the suit of Kapiolani Estate vs. A. S. Cleg-horn is \$37.50. The motion of the plaintiff for a new trial has been denied. An appeal will be made.
