

SUCCESS ASSURED

Stores May Close on Saturday Next.

EARLY CLOSING ENCOURAGED

Y. W. C. A. Ladies Now Hope to Have Movement Inaugurated on August 17th.

IN THE matter of the Saturday afternoon closing of stores, the ladies who are interested in the movement are much encouraged by the developments of yesterday. The success of the petition is now assured, as the names of nearly all the dry goods and grocery firms have been added to the list.

Mrs. Brown, secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association, to whose earnest work is due the apparent success of the plan, now hopes to have the general movement inaugurated on Saturday next, and has arranged for an afternoon of pleasure and recreation under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Association. During the afternoon and evening the members of the Young Women's Christian Association, and their friends will enjoy a trolley ride to Pacific Heights and an hour or so of social pleasure in the pretty Japanese garden at the summit.

In the article which appeared in yesterday's Advertiser the names of W. W. Dimond & Co. and several others were mentioned as having been signed to the agreement, the terms of which were not specified in particular. Dimond & Co. and a number of others, while not signing the original petition, signified their willingness to close their stores at 1 p. m. on Saturdays through the warm months on condition that the movement is a general one. This was misunderstood by some persons. The signatures of all the firms were appended to the petition on this understanding. Mr. and Mrs. Brown were busy yesterday afternoon among the grocery merchants, and report success, as there are few who have yet been interviewed that object to closing if all other stores close.

Among other letters of encouragement the following one was received unsolicited from Whitney & Marsh by Mrs. Brown yesterday:

Mrs. Henry C. Brown, Superintendent Y. W. C. A.

Dear Mrs. Brown—We wish to express our very cordial approval of your efforts to induce a general early closing movement of all the stores of Honolulu on Saturday afternoons.

It is a fact, though hardly realized, that volume of business does not depend upon the number of hours a day or week the doors of a store are kept open.

Timothy Eaton, the venerable founder of T. Eaton & Co. Ltd., Canada's greatest department store, when asked what were the factors which contributed to his success, replied that chief among them was the undeviating principle of early closing.

"Thirty years ago," said Mr. Eaton, "nobody closed at 6 o'clock. We did. Later, we closed at 5 o'clock during the months of July and August, and at 1 o'clock on Saturdays, and stuck to it. And let me add for the benefit of American merchants that even at Christmas time our store is shut tight at 6 o'clock."

It will be conceded, we think, that in the United States, also, the greatest successes in the business world have been those men who adopted the most liberal policy toward their employees, and early Saturday closing means giving the tired clerks an opportunity to take breath after their endeavors of the week.

We cannot close this letter without telling you how much we appreciate the good work which you and the Young Women's Christian Association are doing for our girls.

The attractive little lunch which you provide every noon, and the restfulness of your cool, airy rooms, make a very pleasant break in the middle of the girls' very busy day, and, encouraged by your kindly words and cheerful smile, they come back to us eager to labor, eager to please, and above all, eager to do right. DEATH OF WM. ABBEY.

Another Old Kamaaina Passes to the Further Shore.

William Abbey, who has been ill for the past four months, died last Sunday evening at the Queen's Hospital and was buried yesterday afternoon at the Pearl City Cemetery.

Mr. Abbey was well known in Hawaii. He came here about thirty years ago from England. He was a brick-layer and plasterer by trade and worked on almost every plantation on these Islands. He first worked on the Elelee plantation, Kaula, then owned by Mr. August Drier. He married Miss Mary Munden, daughter of the late James Munden, and sister of George Munden of Kealia, Kauai. He also worked for several contractors in this city on large buildings, among them being the postoffice, Progress block and several others. He leaves five sons and one daughter, William H., James F., George C., Harry E., Albert A. and Flora S., all of whom have attended the Kamehameha Schools. There were only two present at his funeral services, William H. and Albert A., the rest being on the other Islands.

The services were conducted by the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh at the H. H. Williams undertaking parlors, and a special train was despatched to Pearl City Cemetery, where he was laid in his last resting place. Mr. Abbey was nearly sixty years old at the time of his death.
