KING OF SIAM MAY COME

He Wants to Cross the Pacific and See the United States.

BANGKOK, Siam, July 25.—Hamilton King, United States Minister here, has been informed through Prince Devawongse, Minister for Foreign Affairs, that King Chulalongkorn, of Siam, would like to pay a visit to America in the near future. His Majesty has it in mind to visit Japan next year, and would be pleased to avail himself of the same opportunity to visit the United States also. The Minister thinks that such a visit would lead to a better appreciation of American institutions on the part of the Siamese.

For some years there have been periodical rumors that the King intended visiting America. There is a certain degree of caution required in discussing and arranging such a trip, because of the necessity for determining the exact status of the King abroad, in such a manner that nothing might happen in his treatment which would cause him to lose dignity in the eyes of his people. While the King was on his trip through Europe several years ago circumstances with regard to his reception gave rise to much newspaper comment and misinterpretation. It is against the possibility of a repetition of such misinterpretation that he wishes to guard.

DESIRES TO BE NATION'S GUEST.

He appreciates that for one monarch to visit the realm of another means an invitation from the sovereign host, and more or less recognition on the part of the government to which he is of necessity in the position of a guest. He at the same time appreciates that with our Republic it must be quite otherwise, and while he fully understands this and would be glad to go to the United States in a private capacity, if he could do so for the sake of the education it would be to himself and to his people, he feels a fear that to go in such a manner might be regarded in Siam as indicating something of hostility, or, at least, indifference, to his country.

It is hoped by Americans here that it will be possible for the President to extend to his Majesty an invitation to visit the United States. The King would come with his suite in his own yacht to San Francisco.

BIDS FOR PIPE ARE TOO HIGH

The Kalihi Extension of Water Mains Consequently Cannot Be Made.

The proposed extension of the water mains out Kalihi way will not be made because the bids received yesterday exceeded the amount of the appropriation allowed for the work.

Tenders were asked for 5,000 feet of cast-iron bell and spigot pipe, and also for 8 and 8-inch valves.

Three bids were submitted, as follows: Vincent & Belser, pipe \$1.16 1/2 per lineal foot; valves, \$25 each. Von Hamm-Young Company, pipe, \$44.75 per ton; valves, \$25.50 each. Honolulu Iron Works, pipe, \$35 per ton; valves, \$24.75 each.

As the cost of the material would exceed the appropriation, it was decided not to go ahead with the work at present.

New Steerage Rates.

Representatives of the Washington, Oregon and Canadian steamship companies, operating steamers from the North Pacific coast to Asiatic waters, have agreed upon a uniform rate for carrying steerage passengers from Tacoma, Seattle, Vancouver or Portland to the Orient, says the Tacoma Ledger of August 2. The new schedule of rates will be announced in a few days and will go into effect this week. Representatives of the company yesterday declined to state what rates had been agreed upon.

The Canadian Pacific line has maintained a \$52 steerage rate to Japan and China, and the Washington and Oregon companies a \$30 to \$50 rate, varying with the individual case. No change will be made in the charge from the Orient to America, and a differential is allowed in favor of the companies operating against the Canadian Pacific. The representatives of the different companies are to meet again soon to consider other matters pertaining to Asiatic passenger and freight traffic.

THE MOSQUITO AND THE OIL.

The New York Post contains the following concerning the oil route for the extermination of the mosquito:

Give the mosquito a bad name and hang him. In addition to his well-known crimes as a disturber of the peace and a distributor of the germs of malaria and yellow fever (these soft impeachment he confesses), he is now charged with being disseminator of smallpox and an incendiary. This last role is assigned the mosquito by imaginative Jerseymen, who see in it a cruel revenge taken by the long-suffering insect for the attempts made by mere men to exterminate him through the use of kerosene in his favorite breeding-places. According to the story, the mosquito, in true ghoulish glee, fills himself full of oil, then flies to a lamp or gas jet to ignite himself, after which the work of setting fire to houses is easy, and he expires in a glorious blaze of the property of his enemy. The tale is brilliantly imaginative, but betrays a certain ignorance on the part of its inventor. He evidently supposes that the oil treatment for mosquitoes consists in catching the elusive creature and carefully pouring kerosene down his throat. The fact

is, of course, that the oil film on standing or stagnant water is intended to nip the mosquito in the very bud of his larva. That it does so successfully, when the method is thoroughly and persistently followed, there is a vast and increasing mass of testimony to prove. The coolest-headed scientists are the ones who tell us that the mosquito plague can be almost absolutely extinguished. If we allow ourselves to be tormented by it much longer it will be because we are too ignorant or too lazy to adopt the remedy at our hand.

In a case reported by a French physician a woman had been growing thin and weak for three years, with all signs of dyspepsia, and had had sixteen successive attacks of erysipelas. It was at last decided that hair dye must be the cause. Examination showed that this dye contained resorcin, and on stopping its use health had gradually returned.
