


SCENES ON THE LONE ROCK OF NIHOA, N. W. OF THIS GROUP.

SIXTO LOPEZ TELLS WHAT HIS PEOPLE DEMAND OF US

SENOR SIXTO LOPEZ, who is at present making a short stay in this city, is on his way home from an extensive trip to the States, where he has given many lectures, and issued numerous pamphlets in behalf of the Filipino people.

The great which he has of annexation as a mere American colony has led him to go very deep into the question of the capacity of the Filipino for self-government, showing for instance in his speech in Philadelphia that there were very few Filipinos who could not read and write at the time of the first Spanish occupation, and that Manila already had a university several years before the Pilgrim Fathers landed on Plymouth Rock.

Creseus, the new champion of the world, is a chestnut horse, a little over 15 1/2 hands high. He is 7 years old, having been foaled in 1894. Creseus first attracted widespread attention in 1898 when, as a 4-year-old, he trotted a mile in 2:09 3/4.

If the Duke of Portland's horse had been a little quicker at his last Derby his owner would have won three of these races, or more than any living owner can claim.
