THE CROWD HAD A LITTLE PACING

During the afternoon a match race was brought off between M. H. Drummond's bay gelding Los Angeles, and I. Levingston's black gelding Dan D. The race was the best two out of three half-mile heats for buggies for a dinner. In the first heat Los Angeles broke badly at the start, and the black trotter opened up a big gap. In the stretch Los Angeles came very fast, and just squeezed home in front of his opponent, which broke just before the wire was reached. Time 1:24.
Los Angeles took the second easily in 1:22 1/2.
Later on Charlie Bellina drove Lustré a half-mile heat against Dan D. piloted by Dickson, winning as he liked in 1:18.

ATHLETICS BEST STARS ONCE MORE

Once more the Honolulu Athletic Club baseball men have taken the Stars into camp with a goodly majority, and that the crowd which devoted the afternoon to baseball rather than to field sports at the park, enjoyed itself, was testified by the amusement which was afforded, and the applause which was given. It was an athletic club crowd, too, for the greatest part of the shouting was done for the men in white and red.
The game was played out in center of the race track, and much of the bad playing must be charged to the fact that the ground was in very poor condition. The game was marred by the encroachment of the crowd of at least two thousand people, which at various times was about the field upon the playing space. This was so marked that the people were within a yard of the base lines, while in the outfield there was little chance for the recovery of any long hit without running into the crowd. The police arrangements were positively bad, for as the deputy sheriff was one of the officials of the game, his subordinates gave only sporadic thought to the crowd, and then usually to do something unnecessary. Two or three members of the committee having the sports in charge were hustled liberally while the chronic hanger-on was permitted to enjoy a front and encroaching rank. Being without badges the men were not recognized by the police, but rather as prize fighters, and the conduct of one of the number showed that the guess might have been a good one.
It was a slugging match between the teams, but the long hits were almost always such by courtesy, owing to the fact that the crowd was so close to the fielders. Pryce was the hitting star, with four to his credit, while Nowell, Lewis, Hansmann and Aylett were always reliable. Thompson and Wilder were the unlucky ones, for while they would hit the ball it was not with safety. The Athletics played a new catcher, Lewis, who promises to be a wonder. He caught Kaal with precision and threw to bases with some certainty, though he is plainly in need of coaching.
Details of the game would be wearisome. There were four errors for the Athletics, and twice as many for the Stars. The Athletics began scoring with a rush when Pryce, with a base on balls, and Thompson's dropped fly scored and paved the way for five of his clubmen to follow on hits by the rest of the team, and another error. There were scores whenever they were needed, the seventh adding four on a double, a triple and two base hits. The Stars made a rally in the eighth, when with bases filled by two hits and a base on balls, men were forced over the plate by hits, Lishman double-clearing the bags. It was too late though, for the ninth was only good for three, one of which was decidedly off color. The score:
