

There are about 1,600 languages or dialects into which no part of the Bible has yet been translated.

The municipal council of Prague has decided to appropriate for building purposes a large part of the famous Jewish cemetery.

A report submitted to the International Ecumenical Conference in London, shows that there are 24,893,421 adherents of the Methodist faith.

M. C. Sloss, chairman, and Jacob Nieto, secretary, have issued a letter to the Jewish community of the Pacific Coast asking \$100,000 in behalf of the Denver Hospital for consumptives.

NEW ZEALAND TRIBUTE TO M'KINLEY

The President is dead. Thus suddenly have hope and thankfulness given place to sorrow and resignation. Thus too fully have the forebodings of a week since been justified. The shock of the bereavement, following so unexpectedly upon the cheering bulletins which restored the spirits of Anglo-Saxondom, makes all expressions of sorrow seem empty and meaningless. To say that the British world sympathizes with its American kindred is to confuse our feelings. Not a loyal Englishman in the world today but has been mentally benumbed by the sad news as by the shock of a keen personal loss. For we all know that Anglo-Saxondom has given another martyr to its political faith, that our race has lost a great and worthy leader, that a widow weeps because her husband trusted all men and trusted in vain. When the future weighs the comparative merits of the American Presidents, there can be little doubt but that William McKinley will be ranked as the greatest of those who have hitherto succeeded Abraham Lincoln. For twenty years McKinley has been foremost in American politics; not as a mere party politician, but as a statesman with a policy, not as a stalking horse of party managers, but as a man with ideas, as a master and moulder of men. It was McKinley to whom the Republican party turned when the silver mania threatened to snatch a majority from the hands of any purely party nominee. It was McKinley who met and foiled Bryanism in 1896, and overthrew it utterly in November last. Under his administration, the United States
