

MEN'S HOTEL SOON TO BE UNDER WAY

Calls will be sent out at once for an installment of the subscriptions to the stock of the Men's Hotel, and immediately upon the payment of the demands there will be an application made for the charter for the corporation.

The following officers have been elected by the stockholders of the corporation: President, W. R. Castle; vice president, George Davies; Treasurer, J. A. McCandless; secretary, Theodore Richards. These officials will constitute the board of directors for the present, and it was by their action that the call for the first installment on the stock was made.

The revenue which will come in under this call will be used in making payments on the property of the corporation. The old Hopper estate, which is at King and Punchbowl streets, will be the site of the proposed hotel. The house is now used as a refuge or home by the Salvation Army. The option price is \$48,000, and the men behind the scheme are of opinion that there will be only a short time elapse before the plans will be in shape for the construction of the buildings.






