A Brilliant Season of the Neill Drama.

TO OPEN IN BARBARA FRIETCHIE


Company Will Leave Here for a Tour of the Orient and Australia.

Charles Astor Parker, manager of the Neill Company, that is to give Honolulu a brilliant season of drama for twelve performances beginning next Saturday evening, in speaking of the prospects of the Neill season here, said yesterday: "We have been looking forward to our engagement in Honolulu with much pleasant anticipation for some time. In our touring of the states we have had the pleasure of meeting dozens of people from Honolulu in all parts of the country and during our engagement of nearly four months in San Francisco we enjoyed visits from them most every week. The coming to Honolulu is something of a vacation for us. It is about the only rest we get. You would hardly call it a rest to be prepared to present twelve different plays in as many performances, but they are all plays in our regular repertoire, plays that we have but recently presented in San Francisco, and all members of the company are perfect in their various parts, so that we will have time to do considerable visiting with our Honolulu friends between performances. The week each way on the ocean is also most delightful, and in restful contrast with the hard work that we have to undergo during what we call our regular season. At the close of our engagement here we return at once to Los Angeles, Calif., there to begin an engagement of six weeks, after which we start on a tour embracing nearly all of the states and return to San Francisco for three months next summer. Next year we will have three companies on the road, one of which will have Miss Julia Dean, the ingenue of the present Neill company, as the star. Mr. Neill and the newspapers of the states regard her as the best ingenue on the American stage, and we have secured a fine play for her, and will star her next season and see if the public will bear out these opinions in showing their appreciation of Miss Dean's art. It is possible also that another member of our company will be started next season by another manager. So you see that it seems that the Neill company is a sort of an incubator for dramatic stars. Blanche Bates began with our company. So did Julia Arthur and the Frawley company sprang from the Neill company in 1894. "It is one of the policies of the Neill company management to never exhibit the same scenery or stage effects twice in the same city, and for that reason none of the elaborate stage equipment to be shown during the coming engagement of Mr. James Neill's Neill Opera House is old, it all having been made new during the company's recent extended engagement in California. Some of the stage settings are said to be among the most elaborate ever shown in modern plays, and the authors of the many fine plays in our company's repertoire demand very high royalties for the rights to present their plays. 
