Mr. Ah's Dream
Sent Him to
Prison.

JUDGE SCORES FAMILY WRECKER

Hora Built a House for J. Lucas
and Then Started to Demolish
it With Axes.

Two very heavy penalties were imposed by Judge Wilcox in the District Court yesterday. Manuel Garcia was charged with adultery and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and serve three months in jail. Mrs. Lina Bailey was fined \$30 and costs on a similar charge, and Ah Cheong, charged with gross cheat, was sentenced to be imprisoned at hard labor for one year.

The magistrate gave Garcia a particularly stiff lecture and said that the alienation of the affections of a married woman merited the full penalty of the law. Attorney Vivas, who appeared for the defense, noted an appeal in the case of the male defendant.

Ah Cheong was alleged to have signed the name of Wong Kwal to a check for \$50 on Bishop's bank. The charge was originally one of forgery, but that of gross cheat was substituted, in order that the case might be disposed of without incurring the delay attendant upon a commitment to the Circuit Court. Defendant said "he done it."

He told the Court that he was pinched for money at the time, and that he owed a friend \$50, which was troubling his conscience. One night he saw a vision while he slept. In the vision a man appeared to him and told him to make out a check for \$50, with which money he was to discharge his obligations.

When Ah Cheong came to the next morning he got him a couple of blank checks and asked Wong Kwal, who loved him, to fill them out. Wong Kwal filled out the checks all right, but balked when it came to signing them. Then Ah Cheong took the pen to save his friend the trouble, and attached an imitation of Wong Kwal's autograph to the checks. Defendant said that he thought it would be all right, and emphatically declared that he meant to do nothing wrong.

Here High Sheriff Brown joshed the dreamer a little, and asked him if he remembered seeing a little room with iron bars and no carpet on the floor in his dream.

When Ah Cheong had done relating his visionary experiences, Judge Wilcox took up the subject. He said that he sometimes had dreams and that it was his experience that they went by contraries. "You can't bank on a dream," said he to defendant, "as you found out, by the bye. According to your dream everything was going to be lovely and the reverse has proved to be the case. You had an idea that if you got that \$50 it would be pau pilikia, and the result is that you find yourself in several new kinds of a scrape."

Other cases dealt with were: Kahaleohi, Lee Kee, profanity, Nov. 22; John Crane, Welsh, Gusque, Manuel Dias Malis, P. Joanda Aglante, drunkenness, \$2 and costs; Dol, horse untied, \$5 and costs.

Joe Lucas the hack driver, had Hora, a Japanese contractor, arrested yesterday. Lucas says that some time ago Hora contracted to build a house for Lucas. The job was to be finished by July, but Hora did not live up to his contract and Lucas had to take possession before the house was completed. Moreover, according to Lucas, the work was most unsatisfactorily done. Lucas registered a kick and Hora demanded a small balance due him before he would make any changes.

Lucas insisted that the work be done before the contractor got his cash, and on Wednesday Hora and a number of other Japanese commenced to tear down the house. Mrs. Lucas was alone in the house at the time, and was only apprised of the work of destruction by the crashing of axes. When Lucas arrived on the scene, answer to a summons from his wife, one side of the house had been demolished. He made Hora cease his work of destruction and summoned the police to the scene. Lucas will bring a civil suit for damages against the contractor.

A STORY OF J. J. HILL.

Mr. Hill is the autocrat of the Great Northern Railroad. Since Commodore Vanderbilt's time there has not been so complete an instance of one-man power at the head of a great railroad system as is presented in the case of President Hill. He evolves policies and executes them, his directors bowing to his will with dignified but unanimous docility. Men in the employ of the Great Northern know that unless they satisfy James J. Hill their fate is sealed. There is no other court of appeal. And President Hill has the reputation of being "very particular," to use the cautious phrase of his subordinates.

One day Mr. Hill walked into the office of a high official of the Great Northern Railroad in St. Paul and brusquely announced: "Mr. I do not think that you and myself are well mated. Your successor will report for duty tomorrow."

This high official had been drawing a salary of \$10,000 a year for a long time and he had grown into the belief that he was a fixture in the Great Northern service. But he went without arguing the question with Mr. Hill. Ainslee's Magazine.

Dr. Charles W. Pollock, mayor pro tem of Charleston, S. C., was invited to address the National Association of Funeral Directors there last week and staggered the assembled undertakers by making an earnest and eloquent appeal for cremation. His hearers were naturally indignant, but allowed Dr. Pollock's address to go on the minutes.
