GOV. TAFT COMING HOME.

His Health Affected by an Operation—May Come This Way.
MANILA, November 29.—The operation performed on Governor Taft this afternoon was successful. He expects to start for Washington December 10th to recuperate and confer with Secretary Root.

WASHINGTON, November 29.—The Secretary of War today issued orders and sent them to Manila ordering Governor Taft home on leave of absence, 22 he can recuperate and regain his health and strength. Governor Taft is to leave for the United States on the first transport available. At present there are no transports at Manila, but the Kilpatrick is due there from New York in a day or two and will be ready to sail for home in about ten days. The Kilpatrick belongs to the New York line, but if Governor Taft desires to come by Honolulu and does not care to go to New York the Kilpatrick will be ordered to San Francisco. If the Governor does not care to come on the Kilpatrick, the Grant will be ready to sail about the middle of December and the Meade will follow the Grant.
While in this country Governor Taft will be called to Washington to give the committees of Congress information for the necessary legislation for the islands.

ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON.

Wm. E. Henley Sharply Criticizes the Novelist's Admirers.

NEW YORK, November 23.—The Post's London cable says: The literary sensation of the week is William E. Henley's onslaught upon the Stevenson worshippers. In tone it is not dissimilar from that of his attack on indiscriminate eulogists of Burns. As Stevenson's closest friend, he strips Stevenson's personality of the fantastic romance woven about it and shows him to have been at times a vain, ungrateful, self-righteous, anxious egotist, possessed of abundant but imitative gifts. The criticism provokes indignant surprise among the admirers of the author of "Treasure Island," though, however ungenerous it may seem, it will serve as a useful corrective of the undue lengths to which the Stevenson cult has been carried in some quarters. This week's publication of Henley's latest book of verses, entitled "Hawthorn and Lavender," is held to attest his undoubtedly high place among English poets, in defiance alike of conventional criticism and of tradition.

Cathode Ray Cures Cancer.

NEW YORK, November 28.—A special to the Sun from Atlanta says: Cathode rays have been put to another crucial and entirely satisfactory test here in the treatment of aggravated cancer. E. A. Heard, a telegraph operator, whose lower lip and jaw were almost entirely eaten away by the disease, was cured in fifteen treatments, extending over about six weeks, by Dr. W. B. Hutchinson of this city. The rays were applied directly to the exposed parts for ten minutes and the treatment was resumed at an interval of three days. The first ten applications apparently had no effect on the cancerous growth, but at the end of that time a rapid healing inclination appeared and five additional treatments completed the cure. Since the middle of April there has been no indication of the return of the disease, and physicians here consider the cure permanent. Heard refused to discuss the matter until tonight, but is now satisfied that his cure is perfect.
