PROMINENT CANADIANS
Drs. Oronhyatekha and Montague in Honolulu.
LATTER FORMERLY STATE SECRETARY
Full-Blooded Mohawk Indian Who Might Have Been Premier of Canada.

Hon. W. H. Montague, P. C., late Secretary of State for Canada, and the Hon. Dr. Oronhyatekha, are through passengers on the steamship Aorangi from Australia for Canada. They speak in the highest terms of Captain Phillips and his officers, every comfort having been provided for them on the voyage. Dr. Montague was in public life in Canada a long time, having been a member of the Dominion Parliament for years. He went to Australia in March to attend the opening of the new Federal Parliament and to consult in governmental matters in Victoria and do some things in which the Independent Order of Foresters were interested. He is now returning to Canada.

Hon. Dr. Oronhyatekha but recently visited Australia upon a general tour of inspection of the society of which he is the Supreme Chief Ranger. This is an exceptionally large fraternal life insurance company doing business on the continents of America, Europe, Asia and Australia. Something of its strength may be understood when it is learned that no less than 99,000 members are found among citizens of the United States.

Dr. Oronhyatekha is a remarkable man. He is a full-blooded Mohawk Indian, being a descendant of the United Empire Loyalist Indians. Forty years ago he presented the address upon the behalf of his nation to the present King of England, who was then visiting Canada as the Prince of Wales, and immediately thereafter was invited by Sir Henry Auckland, who accompanied the prince to visit England and to take a course at Oxford University, which he did. He is also a graduate of the Toronto University in medicine, and for many years was a practitioner in Canada. He has always refused to enter public life, though in the opinion of Sir John Macdonald, the greatest of all the Canadian premiers, Dr. Oronhyatekha would have been prime minister had he done so. He has for twenty years been the head of the Foresters body, and under him it has proved one of the greatest institutions of the kind in the world. He is at present also Consul General for Liberia.

With regard to Australian affairs, Dr. Montague said the new parliament was laying out the foundation work of the confederation. The tariff which had been recently introduced was a pretty high one, and was causing a great deal of discussion. The free trade elements in some of the States of the Commonwealth are very strong.

"One of the most difficult questions which Australians have to deal with at present," said Dr. Montague last evening, "is that of immigration from the Pacific Islands, 'white Australia' being the policy of the government. This is strongly opposed in Queensland, where Kanakas are employed on the large sugar plantations. Something of the importance of that industry may be understood when it is known that no less than \$30,000,000 are invested in sugar plantations in that State alone. Labor legislation is in a very advanced way in most of the States. In some of them the minimum wage scale has been opposed. The rate per day placed it at about \$1.87 per man. In New Zealand and in most of the States, old age pension laws exist and these are becoming quite a burden upon the public exchequer."

Dr. Montague said he found Australian manufactures in large quantities in Sydney and Melbourne, and in other parts of Australia. He was also glad to be able to say that he had found large quantities of Canadian imports, particularly in agricultural machinery, and canned goods. He said that Canadians hoped to get better trade connections with Australia than at present when the Pacific cable becomes an accomplished fact. Canada gives Australia a preference, but this has not been reciprocated in the new tariff. Dr. Montague has hopes that it will be later on.

ted it was impossible for him to remain longer this time. He had paid some attention to the resources and productions of the Islands, and he looked upon them as having a prosperous future. Dr. Montague is also a member of the Independent Order of Foresters, and will accompany the Supreme Chief Ranger to the convention of the Supreme Court order which takes place in Los Angeles during the first part of April. Both gentlemen will then go to the coronation of King Edward. Dr. Montague is from Hamilton, Ontario, which is one of the leading cities of Canada. Dr. Oronhyatekha has his business in Toronto, but his real home is "The Pine" in the county of Hastings, near the Indian reservation. He has also a magnificent home on the St. Lawrence river.

Being on an all round the world trip in the interest of foreign missions, the committee of the Simultaneous Mission was fortunate in having his services, at least for a time, at the beginning of the great mission. The large experience gained among the missions in America has enabled him to infuse life and zeal into the work now being conducted in this city.—Sydney Herald.
