**W. B. BUCHANAN DEAD.**

**Old Kamaaina Dies at Age of Seventy Two.**

William Robert Buchanan, an old-time resident of this city, died yesterday morning at 11:30 o'clock of weakness induced by old age and aggravated by an accident in which he fractured his knee some days ago.

The deceased was seventy-two years of age, and has been a resident of Honolulu for thirty odd years. He was a native of Canada, and came here from Australia, marrying a Miss Brickwood shortly after his arrival. He was an expert accountant, his services being in demand by many of the prominent firms of the town. Mr. Buchanan was a prominent Mason in Australia, but failed to affiliate with the local lodges. His immediate relations are prominent in banking circles in Montreal. He leaves a family of ten, all of whom are living, Charles Buchanan of Pukoo, Molokai; William Buchanan of Queensland, Australia; Mrs. Brundage, Mrs. Hope, Mrs. William Cornwell Jr., Mrs. Allan Dunn, Mrs. Henry Almy, Wentworth Buchanan and Alexander and Agnes Buchanan.

The funeral services will be held at the residence, on McCully street, tomorrow at 12:30 o'clock, the interment taking place at Pearl City. The following will be pallbearers: Andrew Brown, W. C. Peacock, L. A. C. Paris, T. P. Cummings, Clarence Crabbe and Donald Ross.


