POISON FOUND IN AOKI'S STOMACH

Inquest Held and Open Verdict Returned—Probably Swallowed Stramonium Seeds.

An inquest was held last night on the body of Aoki, the Japanese who was found dead on Saturday in the house of Stephen Mahalu on the Beach road.

Dr. Shorey, the government chemist, testified that he had examined the stomach of the deceased and found that death was due to stramonium poisoning. From the contents of the intestines particles were separated, identical in appearance to those of Datuna Stramonium, a common weed here.

Mary Paahao testified that she lived at Waikiki and that deceased was an employee of Stephen Mahalu. Last Friday night witness, her husband, Stephen Mahalu and others, were in the parlor. About 9 o'clock Aoki asked to be allowed to go to bed. About 1 o'clock the next morning hearing a noise, some of the folks in the house went into the Jap's room and found that he was dead. He only groaned two or three minutes. Drs. Marvin and Waterhouse were notified of the occurrence, but both refused to come out.

A Japanese named Sugi testified that he knew Aoki, who was about 37 years of age. He had a wife in Japan. Not long ago he had a dispute with a Chinaman, who was working with him. No blows were struck.

The jury returned the following verdict: "That the said Aoki, a male Japanese, 37 years of age, came to his death at Waikiki, Honolulu, on the 15th day of February, from poisoning, said poison having been taken by said Aoki, probably by mistake. We further find that there is no reason to believe that said poison was administered to said Aoki by any person other than himself."

The jury consisted of W. Savidge, F. Gould, T. H. Petrie, Chas. Dickson, F. L. Dortch, Jno. K. Nakookoa.

traced some other method of securing a livelihood. With annexation, labor contracts became illegal, and laborers were often elected to shift for themselves rather than go to the plantations. A few years ago a beggar was practically unknown on any of the Islands. The Hawaiian would rather have starved than to ask for alms, for there was always plenty to be had in the fields and valleys without the asking. Life then was not a problem, but a pleasure, and the happy-go-lucky native had no fear of the future. Now begging is getting common.

The police were not needed in those days for the detection of crime. They were used more as the spies of the various forms of government which succeeded each other in rapid succession just prior to the annexation of the Islands to the United States. There is no getting a time was as complete and as perfect as that of Russia or France, not in the detection of crime, but in the search for treason and plots against the government.

Every other man was an informer in the pay of the police, or with the hope of a reward for the detection of some conspiracy. No stranger arrived but his business and history and intentions were known within twenty-four hours.

No thought was given to any crimes other than those against the existing government, and police records show an almost total absence of thieving and kindred crimes. The Chinese, it is true, were much given to gambling, and still are. Frequent libations of sake on the part of the Japanese often makes them quarrelsome, and arrests were required to quell the belligerent spirit induced by the drink.

Now all this is changed. The open residence is an exception rather than the rule. The police are no longer the spies of the lower classes of the Americans and has brought its inevitable result. Doors are barred at night by the merchants.

There has been hardly a day for the last six months in which some form of larceny has not been reported to the police. Burglaries are frequent, and have increased alarmingly the past few weeks.

The police seem powerless to stop this epidemic of crime, and lack of money has made it impossible to increase the police protection. There is no belief to be an organized gang of thieves at work in the city. A few days ago thieves robbed the United States mail on board an island steamer, and their booty is estimated at \$15,000.

Hawaiians have lost their former distinguishing trait of honesty, for they form almost as large a percentage in the courts as other nationalities.

The police force now is a peculiar institution. It is composed largely of natives who do not understand the ways of the American criminal and cannot comprehend the meaning of this new reign of terror. There are also Chinese, Japanese and Portuguese policemen, and a "Por" brigade composed of the police force is very good. There is a mounted squad, both bicycle and horse, and the natives are the finest built men in the Islands.

For actual police duty they are of little value. For the detection of treason and political crimes they are as good as in former days, and apparently do not understand that their usefulness in that direction is gone.

In the meantime the people of the Islands have taken the matter into their own hands, broken their doors and locked the windows, and are preparing to resist the attacks of the new element which their former feeling of security has drawn hither.
