



UNEVENTFUL WAS CHINA'S TRIP

Fast Pacific Mail Liner Brought Four Passengers and 724 Tons of Cargo.

The Pacific Mail liner China arrived from the Orient yesterday about 1:30 p. m., docking at the Quarantine wharf. Purser Jerome reported a good trip with fair weather all the way. The run from Hongkong was made in 21 days and from Yokohama in ten days. The China brought four cabin passengers for Honolulu and 724 tons of cargo. She has 25 cabin passengers for San Francisco and 1960 tons of through freight.

The China sails for San Francisco at noon today.

A curious incident occurred just as the China was about a yard away from the wharf. A nondescript brown dog espied a large and meaty bone stuck in the mouth of the steamer's garbage chute.

Hunger got the better of the canine's discretion and he made a leap for the bone across the chasm which extended from the wharf to the side of the vessel. A score of interested spectators expected to see him fall back into the water; but no. Seizing the bone in his teeth and holding on thereto with a deathlike grip, he literally saved himself with the skin of his teeth from a watery grave.

In a minute or so the vessel was close alongside the wharf, and the intelligent canine gave a backward and upward jump, which resulted in his landing on the wharf with the bone in his mouth. He trotted off to a dark corner with his prize, and there munched it with genuine satisfaction.

Naval Notes.

Captain E. F. Tilley has been ordered to relieve Captain C. H. Rockwell as captain of the Mare Island Navy Yard.

Rear Admiral R. D. Evans will pass through here on the Gaelic. He has been ordered to the Asiatic station as senior squadron commander relieving Rear Admiral Kempff.

The U. S. S. Mohican arrived at Tutuila February 24. The U. S. S. collier Nero sailed on March 17 from Montevideo for Tutuila, and will probably touch at Honolulu. Warrant Machinist Murray of the U. S. S. Solace, well known here, has been ordered to duty at Guam.

The U. S. gunboat Wheeling sailed from San Francisco for Magdalena Bay on March 23. She will call here on her way to Samoa, where she goes to relieve the station ship Abarenda, which will proceed to New York.

Lieut. F. L. Chapin will pass through here on the Gaelic. He is flag lieutenant on the staff of Rear Admiral Evans. Lieutenant T. Washington, Admiral Evans' aide, will also be aboard the Gaelic, as will Ensign F. T. Evans, a son of Admiral Evans, who will be on his father's staff.

Ensign A. N. Mitchell, son of Circuit Court Judge Mitchell of Ohio, has reported here for duty aboard the U. S. F. C. S. Albatross.

Gone to Maui.

The U. S. F. C. S. Albatross departed on a cruise yesterday afternoon, her destination being the Maui coast. The Fish Commission steamer will probably be gone two or three weeks and during this time it is confidently expected that many new and strange denizens of the deep will be transferred from the sea to the deck. Surface nets, intermediate nets and trawl nets will be used on the trip.

Aloha Here.

The schooner Aloha, Captain Fry, arrived from Port Gamble last night, with a load of lumber, after an uneventful trip of 29 days. On account of the lateness of the hour when she entered the harbor the vessel anchored in the stream. The Aloha was reported off Koko Head about 4:30 p. m. and the tug Elou went out to her, returning with her tow long after darkness had set in.
