WILL FIT UP A MIRROR STORE
 The Hobron Drug Company is to Move Up Fort Street.

With the close of May the Hobron Drug Company will remove from its present location, taking the store room which is now occupied by E. O. Hall & Sons. The new store will be temporarily fitted with the furniture which is in the present room, but as soon as it can be made, in San Francisco, there will be installed an entirely new outfitting of furnishings.

The plans of Dickey & Newcomb, the architects, for the furnishings, contemplate a mirror room. The main store will be something more than forty feet in depth, extending back to a prescription case and private offices. The entire woodwork will be of quarter sawed oak. The wall cases for the display of the usual tinctures will be backed throughout with mirrors. The counters, of which there will be four, will be of oak with mirrors behind the enclosed show cases below the surface of the counters, and of the two showcases, which will be placed upon each of the counters, leaving only room for wrapping and register spaces.

There will be two cases in the center of the room, for the display of fine goods, and perfumes will be shown in a case built in front of the prescription cases, all being backed with mirrors. The shelves of the show cases throughout will be of glass and there will be no woodwork except where needed to carry the crystal.

The show windows will be refitted and made six feet deep, and the door will be of plate glass, fitted in a frame which will lift up, thus giving every available foot of room for use. The private offices will be divided from the main room by a partition, which will be of the same height as the cases, thus preserving the symmetry of the room. In the rear also will be a private room for all varieties of rubber goods. There will be a rear entrance and the above stairs will be used for storage and wholesale rooms.

As soon as the new furniture arrives and is installed the present furnishings will be removed and placed in the room of the new Sachs block, fronting on Fort street, above the corner. This will be run as a branch store of the company.

A QUESTION OF INSANITARY LANDS

The Bishop Estate yesterday replied to the Board of Health's demand that the low lands in and about Pihalo stream in Kalia be forthwith filled, stating that John Ena was in possession of the property under a lease and that he was expected by the trustees of the estate to deal with the board in the matter. After consideration the board decided to postpone the matter for one week. The following is the letter submitted by the Bishop Estate:

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 17th inst. in which you call attention to certain insanitary premises under the control of the trustees of the estate of B. P. Bishop, namely, the Loko Pawee 1, Kalia, Waikiki.

We have again referred this matter to Mr. John Ena, lessee, to whom we have forwarded a copy of your letter with the request that he satisfy the requirements thereunder.

The trustees have in mind the necessity for the thorough improvement of those premises but the cost involved and the difficulty of securing filling-in material available to the work renders the undertaking a matter of extreme concern and one for which at the present time the trustees are unprepared. It is hoped, therefore, that the improvement of the premises by our tenant, Mr. Ena, will sufficiently abate the nuisance complained of to the satisfaction of your honorable body until other remedies can be adopted.

As will be seen by the enclosed statement the trustees have already expended a considerable sum in the filling of low lands controlled by them in various localities of the city.
