

SLOGGETT WAS NOT TALKATIVE

President Sloggett, of the Board of Health, yesterday refused to discuss business which in his opinion belongs to the body as a whole. It was while the president was busy in his private office that the committee of the Republican Territorial Committee, appointed pursuant to the resolutions of last Saturday's meeting, was announced. Chairman Kennedy and Messrs. Dickey and Stewart made up the delegation of visitors. President Sloggett at once sent out word that he was not to be seen. He declined absolutely to discuss either the Father Wendolin or the rock crusher affairs, but notified the committee that the board would meet Wednesday next at 3 o'clock and that the meeting would be open to them.

Oliver Doud Byron's Great Play Going On Tonight. Tonight at the Orpheum the Elifords will present Oliver Doud Byron's successful play, "The Plunger."
