GRAND JURY IS CALLED FOR TODAY

Gear Will Decide Also That Judges Can Hold But One Court.

Today promises to be an interesting one in the Circuit Court. At the opening of court this morning Judge Robinson will instruct his first grand jury and Judge Gear is expected to give his decision in regard to the rights of the Judges to hold separate courts at the same time.

There is but one case of importance to be considered by this grand jury, and no long address is expected from Judge Robinson when he instructs the grand jury. The jury would not have been called but for the murder of John Watson, alleged to have been committed by George Farris, alias "Kentucky Bill." Farris was held to the grand jury by Judge Wilcox and unless this grand jury was summoned would have been compelled to remain in prison until the next term of court. The grand jury will be in session but a few days as there are but a few other cases to be considered at this time. The usual pleasure excursions of investigation will probably be omitted, as the jury has been drawn strictly for business.

DECISION TODAY.

Judge Gear is expected to give his decision today as to the right of the three Circuit Judges to hold court separately. The ruling will be made in the case of Foo Kee Co. vs. Yoshida et al., and there appears to be but little doubt of the way the second Judge will decide. He will undoubtedly refuse to take jurisdiction of the case on the ground that only one court of the First Circuit may be in session at the same time, and an immediate appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court.

As a way out of the dilemma which has caused so much trouble the three Judges may probably arrange so that one court will be in session continuously, which can be done by extending the term and calling special sessions. This would allow each Judge about four months' vacation in a year. Under this plan a considerable saving could be effected if the Judges saw fit. There would be no necessity for three bailiffs, three stenographers, three clerks, and the extra court machinery which is required when three Judges are in session at the same time, and the expense of the court of the First Circuit might easily be reduced one-half.

S. S. Hawaiian.

PHILADELPHIA, April 22.—The steamer Hawaiian, from Honolulu for Philadelphia, passed the Delaware Breakwater last night. The vessel has traversed a distance of over 14,000 miles, crossing the equator twice on her long run. Heretofore sailing vessels brought the products of the Hawaiian Islands to the East, but the long time they required to make the passage forced the introduction of steam craft. There is now a fleet of steamers in the trade, and as a result the shipments of all products have largely increased.

Took Her Gear.

The ship Arthur Sewall, Captain Gaffrey, which left for New York on Saturday, before sailing connected with the gear which she lost when here a year ago, and succeeded in getting it aboard. It consisted of an anchor and about sixty fathoms of chain, which were located and buoyed, after a lot of persevering work, by Herbert Young, the diver.
