

BIDS FOR FILLING M'KINLEY PARK

Members of the Committee Favor Purchase of the Site.

Bids for the filling of the tract which it is proposed shall be the site for the McKinley Memorial park, will be received up to noon today at the Bank of Hawaii, and the prospect is that the bid will be sufficiently low to make it possible to raise the funds needed for the improvement of the grounds.

A number of bidders have made estimates of the amount of filling and have turned in bids, and some of these are understood to be very low. When the bids have been opened by the committee the plan is to have the bids tabulated and further estimates made as to the total cost of the work. There will then be held a meeting of the committee, when it is expected action will be taken for the purchase of the site.

Many members of the committee favor the purchase at the option price, as it is considered a fair one, after which the land can be allowed to lie idle if there is any question as to the immediate improvement.

Waiaty, Dee and Axtell, to look into the matter and report at a subsequent meeting.

While the tug Fearless was bringing in the bark Carrollton yesterday, she stopped to shorten hawsers, and keeping out of the way of the bark, the tug struck the sand Waikiki, while the ship hit the coral Ewa of the channel. The Elexu took off the ship.

The Department of Public Works has practically concluded negotiations for the acquisition of land from in front of the Moana Hotel to beyond Makee Island, for the widening of the Waiala road. Plans have been made also for the straightening of the road at the Hopkins switch, and that curve will be entirely eliminated.

The death of Mr. Macfarlane occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cooper in Kailua. He was well known in Honolulu, and had been a member of the Scottish Thistle Club.
