BEFORE JUDGE ESTEE.

Swipes Seller Pleads Guilty in United States Court.

In the United States Court yesterday G. W. Kahanauplo pleaded guilty to the charge of selling swipes, without having first paid the special revenue tax. Sentence was postponed until Friday, and the defendant is released upon his own recognizance until that time.

Mele Kewe and Meleanea Kalahua, the two women arrested with Kahanauplo were released, the charge against them having been withdrawn.

An answer was filed yesterday by the owners of the schooner Kawallani, for a violation of the internal revenue laws. The owners claim that the vessel was leased to John Moses, and they knew nothing of the liquor carrying trade. The court is asked to release the vessel.

The judgment in the case of George U. Hind et al. vs. Wilder's Steamship Co. was satisfied yesterday, the decree having been filed in court. The total amount of the judgment was \$62,169.30, which was \$54,639.75 with interest at 6 per cent from May 1, 1900. The suit grew out of the collision between the Claudine and the William Carson, in which the latter boat was sunk. The case has had a varied course through the Circuit and Supreme Courts of Hawaii, the U. S. District Court here, the Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco, and the United States Supreme Court, in all of which there was judgment favoring Hind, Sprackels et al. The long litigation proved expensive for the Wilder Co., the interest alone since the first judgment was announced being over \$7000.

Republican Committee Meeting

The regular meeting of the Republican Territorial Committee will be held this evening and much routine business will be transacted. Up to yesterday no intimation had been given to the chairman or secretary as to whether or not Stewart of the Fifth District will remain in the committee. A resolution probably will be passed calling the precinct clubs to action as early as possible.


