

THE FAT WITH THE LEAN.

Many people are interested in a new idea for the organization of a system whereby recruits may be given the chance, after serving in the Philippines and other tropical outposts, to be stationed near the large cities where are the best means for education and social entertainment.

A writer in the Army and Navy Journal called attention to the severe service in Alaska, Porto Rico and Cuba, with the ever-present danger of disease, and of the Philippines with its never-ending field service and rigorous climate, and says the hour has come when an attempt should be made to do away with "chance" or "possible favoritism," and evolve a scheme founded strictly in equity and justice.

The board, taking into consideration previous stations since 1898 should form a letter by regiment, with rules for assignment for three years, or, perhaps better, two years' service. Further rules would be necessary to relieve officers of such regiments who have completed the class four-two or three years.

SEEKING A CURE.

The Board of Health does well to employ the X-ray and the Copenhagen remedy in the treatment of leprosy. If there is the remotest chance of curing the malady which has made the settlement at Molokai a living tomb for so many people, it is the duty of the Board to act. Discouraging as is the quest for a cure, nature must have one hidden somewhere as the prize of unremitting search.

Perhaps the X-ray will be efficacious in its projection, into the diseased system, of medicated rays. Possibly the Copenhagen remedy will avail. But why should not tuxaria also have a chance? We cannot account for the disfavor which this medicine finds in the Board of Health. It is not proprietary; it is vouched for by people who have seen it tried; yet the experiments with it here have been most perfunctory.

And how great and pressing and paramount, the need of a cure is. Such a thing would not only save multitudes in the world from the misery of living dissolution, but would free Hawaii from a burden of expense and from an unmerited impeachment of its claims as a sanatorium.

Kilauea is doing nothing extraordinary, the "Kau flow" being a mere slope-over from the inner pool into the outer crater. So far, the Imps of Pele have behaved themselves very well indeed. For over a year Kilauea has been gently working up to an eruption and there are no indications, as yet, that it will become lost to its customary sense of seismic propriety.

Senor Sagasta, the veteran statesman of Spain, is in a political corner and will "consult the King." As His Majesty is only sixteen years old he will probably consult his ma. The monarchy business develops some curious freaks of custom.

The idea that people who are just getting over the St. Pierre affair will rush from the coast to Hawaii when they hear that Kilauea is breaking out, need not be patented. Nobody is going to infringe on it.

It is a matter of regret that Porto Rico or any competing sugar point should be able to deprive Hawaii of the services of such a plantation expert as W. J. Lowrie.

It may be noted that the men who say the "water cure" is harmless are not the ones that took it. They are the fellows who prescribed it.

The water cure is bad but it doesn't become the press of the southern fire cure belt to get too ussy over it.

THE OLDEST MASON

Editor Advertiser: In The Advertiser of this morning you give a brief sketch of the life of the late John A. Hassinger, in which you say: "with the exception of W. F. Allen he is the oldest Mason in this country, having been initiated in 1841." Now I have, for some years, been under the impression that I am the oldest Mason in Hawaii, having been initiated in St. John's Lodge, No. 5, in the town of Cobourg, Ontario, Canada, on the 17th of March, 1851, full ten years before Mr. Hassinger's initiation. Fresh air contains about three parts of carbonic acid in 10,000, respired air about 441 parts, and about five parts will cause the air of a room to become "close." Considering the ventilation of street cars, Dr. G. A. Soper calculates that 50 cubic feet of fresh air per minute should be admitted for each passenger. But the supply in cities and underground is much less than this, and the carbonic acid in Mont Cenis tunnel rises to 107 volumes in 10,000; Mersey tunnel, 7.4 to 26.4; Severn tunnel, 4.2 to 11.4; Liverpool Overhead Electric Railway tunnel, 12.9; South London Electric Railway tunnel, 8.4 to 10.8; Metropolitan Railway tunnel, a maximum of 89.4; Boston Subway, 6.53 to 9.45; an electric car in Boston Subway, 24.97; steam car on New York Elevated Railway, 5.8 to 31.2; a New York electric surface car, 6.1 to 26.2. In addition to the headaches and other direct effects of this bad air is the lessened resistance to disease.
