

IN BOARD OF HEALTH

Monthly Meeting Held Yesterday.

TRACY MAKES HIS MONTHLY REPORT

Finds Health Conditions in the City Are Very Good—Milk Prosecution.

Yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health was largely routine. But five members were present, Sloggett, Mott-Smith, Moore, Smith and Dole, and the session lasted but fifteen minutes.

Dr. Douglas of the Government dispensary was granted leave of absence to take his wife, who is ill, to California, and Dr. C. A. Peterson was appointed in his place.

The report of City Sanitary Officer Tracy showed eighteen applications for building permits, all but one of which were approved. Eleven hundred and thirty-two adults can be accommodated in the new buildings to be erected. Note is made of convictions in the District Court of two offenders against the health laws. The report continues:

Vineyard street is now sewer and six of the most offensive and troublesome cesspools in the city have been done away with. The property owners subscribed sufficient money to lay a line of sewer in Buckle Lane which parallels Vineyard street on the makai side, and this has just been completed. We are working to get two other lines of sewer laid and so far the prospects are good.

That swamp which lay between King street and the Oahu Railway below and just Ewa of the foot of Liliha street has been filled by the railway company in a very satisfactory manner and one more of Honolulu's disease breeding localities is wiped out. The railway company is also filling other low lands makai of the track.

I have been after the laundrymen along the Waikiki road and out Beretania street, who have been doing their washing at their places of business contrary to the law, which prohibits them inside of the three-mile limit. There were five of them and it seemed that each place was worse than the others. Two have gone to Iwilei to the Government wash houses and three have built wash houses outside the limits under our supervision.

Three of the inspectors have not been working in any particular districts, but have been on special work.

The reports of the sanitary inspectors for the month were received and filed. Sanitary Officer Bowman of Hilo reported that there had been some friction between the health agents there because of the issuance of permits for lodging houses and restaurants. He thought that it was his duty to issue such licenses. No action was taken. Sanitary conditions are reported to be good in Hilo.

Dr. Cofer reported health conditions in the Colonies as follows: Total cases in Sydney up to June 16th, 132, with thirty-six deaths. For week ending June 14th, five cases and two deaths. At Brisbane, total to June 18th, eighty cases and twenty-four deaths. No new cases since May 31st.

WOMAN BEATER FINDS NO MERCY

Hawaiian Gets Three Months for Brutal Assault on Mistress.

Wife beaters generally fare ill in Judge Wilcox's court, and big six-foot Kaleihua was no exception to the rule for he was sentenced yesterday to six months' imprisonment in Oahu prison at hard labor, for brutally beating the woman who has passed for his wife. The woman's condition was pitiable. Seldom has any more affecting spectacle of man's brutality to woman been exposed to the gaze of the public in court. Both the woman's eyes were black and blue, there was a cut upon her forehead which she constantly wiped with a soiled handkerchief, and she was able to walk only with the assistance of the court officer, for Kaleihua, after beating her about the head with his fists, also kicked her in the thighs and applied a rawhide to her. The man admitted that he had beaten the woman, but pleaded extenuating circumstances to prevent a heavy penalty being imposed. In asking for a heavy sentence, Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth expressed a wish that the law provided for horsewhipping and that the judge in such a case would give him the privilege of applying the lash.

Kaleihua has been guilty of beating the woman several times, and there are still charges of assault on other occasions to be used against him. On July 1 he held her head down to the floor and pounded her with his fists. A swelling was raised which had to be lanced by a physician on Tuesday. One eye was almost knocked out. Not content with using his huge fists Kaleihua kicked the woman upon the thighs and abdomen until she was unable to move a limb. He also assaulted her in the same brutal manner on July 3, while she was ill and bruised from the first beating. She appeared before Judge Wilcox yesterday morning just before the trial and swore to the complaint, that being the first opportunity she had had to get away from her home.

Attorney Kelett, who defended Kaleihua, stated to the court that the woman had expressed forgiveness after the assault of July 1, and he did not think the case should go on. Judge
