LESS FOOD AND DRINK

Adventists Start a Temperance Crusade.

HOLD MEETING IN LARGE TENT

Speakers Protest Against Excesses in Use of Tobacco, Alcohol and Food.

Reform in food and drink was the subject of a meeting held yesterday afternoon in a tent at Kinau and Piko streets by the Seventh Day Adventists. The meeting presented many novel features, not the least of which was the originality of the arguments against the use of alcohol and tobacco, and excess in food of any kind. What the audience lacked in numbers was made up in enthusiasm for the food reforms advocated by the speakers.

Professor J. C. Colcord was the first speaker. He spoke principally upon the subject of "diet," arguing strenuously against excess in not only drink, but food of any kind. He advocated vegetarian diet, though he did not mean by that the use only of vegetables. Six times as much carbonaceous food should be eaten as nitrogenous food, and six times as much bread as beans, and other foods in like proportion. Cereal foods were advocated in the following order: Rice, wheat, corn and oats; and fruits in the following order: Peaches, apricots, blueberries, oranges, bananas, figs, pears. The speaker argued also in favor of mangoes, papayas and other island fruits, saying we should eat the product of the soil wherever we are.

Elder C. E. Leland spoke on the use of tobacco, saying it was a heathenish custom introduced by the North American Indians. Oil of tobacco was the worst poison known, he said, excepting prussic acid.

Rev. J. H. Behrens argued strongly against the use of alcohol, either as a food or as a beverage. Alcohol, he said, was retained as alcohol when taken into the body, and was not assimilated as food. As a beverage it is superfluous and harmful, paralyzing the tongue, stomach cells and muscular and nerve tissues.

NINETEEN CHINESE GAMBLERS RAIDED

David Kapua suspected the existence of a rapid Chinese gambling game in the second story of a building on Hotel street near Smith and so arranged a domiciliary visit for midnight last night. He had the enthusiastic support of a squad and he certainly gave the celestials a surprise party.

Locked and barred doors shut off the players from the outside world, but the police soon broke these down and then it was plain sailing. Nineteen gamblers were inside and they went along without any comment whatever. Then they gave ball and all went back to think of the profit wiped out by being caught.

Hawaii Notes.
James Clements is dead at Waimea. Gardner K. Wilder says at Hilo that the Kona-Kau Railway will be completed in 1903.

The Albatross was in Hilo bay last Wednesday. The members of Company D, N. G. H., are in camp at Cocoanut Island, Hilo.

C. A. Stokic, cashier of the First Bank of Hilo, and Mrs. J. T. Reid were married Saturday evening at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. Reid. They spend their honeymoon in Oloa.

Judge Little decided, in the case of W. W. Thayer, trustee in bankruptcy for C. E. Amama, vs. A. Lidgate, that the Territorial courts had no jurisdiction in bankruptcy cases.

Mrs. Loebenstein entertained at her home at Hilo in honor of the eighteenth birthday of her daughter, Bertha, now at home from Mills College.

Francisco Lopez, who escaped at Hilo while serving a term for cutting a Japanese, was captured at Waiala by John Kelly. There was a reward of \$100 for his capture.

Primo Beer Case Unsettled.
Attorney Silliman returned yesterday on the Alameda from San Francisco, where he endeavored to secure a hearing of the Primo beer case. Owing to the absence of all but one judge the Court of Appeals will not have a sitting in San Francisco until October, and the liquor case cannot be heard before then, unless it is taken to Seattle in September. The matter will now be brought before Judge Estee again, he holding in abeyance a contempt order against Treasurer Wright, pending the appeal.

Killed by Dynamite Explosion.
Two Japanese firemen at Camp 3 pump, Kihel Plantation, Maui, were killed by an explosion of dynamite Monday last. The handle of the life used in drawing ashes was a piece of brass tubing. At the time of sinking the pump wells dynamite was put in brass tubes and thus inserted in the holes. It is supposed some was left in this tube and it was exploded by heat.

A work by Mr. F. W. Theobald on the mosquitoes of the world, prepared to aid medical men in identifying the kinds suspected of spreading disease, describes 300 species, 136 being new. Most of these species are found in and around towns or are pests known to travelers and traders.
