## PRINCE CUPID'S PARTY'S METHODS

stances, while others were deliberately blocked. These things, he said, were worthy of consideration before the people should trust themselves again to such a legislature. He said in doing his duty he was confronted by private interests to such an extent that he came to the conclusion that some leaders wanted to help the framers bill that they overlooked the people altogether. He talked of the future of the party and said that it was ready to make any conditions which would lead to city and county government. He said it was folly for any portion of the community to oppose the multiple government plans and concluded with a dictum that if the other parties would not join for municipal rule then the Kuokoa would go back to the Home Rule party to get it.

Senator Kanuha made one of the most thoughtful addresses of the meeting. He discussed the shortcomings of the legislature and the probable boondoggling by implication. He said that he had been misquoted when he was made to say that Kalaauokalani had asked him to go along to Irwin's and get money. What he had said was that Kalaauokalani had said he was going to Irwin to get coin, and also to other houses. He said that the candidates put up by Kalaauokalani would be men who were out for themselves and him and not for the people.

Prince Cupid was cheered liberally when he appeared, and in a friendly way sat down upon the edge of the table. He said he had been asked to join the Home Rule party, and had done so with the belief that it was for the good of the people. The bolt, he said, was due to the fact that he believed the leaders were leading the people in the wrong way. He said he did not want honor or position. The young people with education and experience in traveling wanted to aid the people. He traced the troubles to the time when he discovered that only two persons had the power to name the various candidates for the Legislature. He insisted that every voter should have a voice in the nominations. He told how Kalaauokalani had written the ex-Queen suggesting that Cupid make the race for the Legislature, and yet he was then calling names.

Prince Cupid declared that the reason that Kalaauokalani wanted Whiteox at Washington was that he wanted something out of the Tramways while he knew that the Prince could not be purchased. He reviewed the causes of the bolt and went into the effects of the division of the party. He said a broken promise meant that the man could not be true to the people who was not true to his word. He said the Kuokoa would try and bring into it all the people of every shade of belief and that there would be no confining of candidates to any one party, but all would be represented. S. Kaloa and M. Kanilheula also spoke. The meeting adjourned amid cheers.

## WOULD NOT SERVE AT AN INQUEST

Wilhelm Lanz Falls Afoul of the Coroner's Jury Law.

Wilhelm Lanz, of the firm of Schaefer & Co., was summoned yesterday afternoon to serve on a coroner's jury in the case of Hakunoto, a Japanese boy who died yesterday of injuries received the day before from a kick by a Portuguese boy. The jury was to meet at 7:30 p. m. at the police station at which time jurymen Herman Kreuger, R. C. A. Peterson, Walter Doyle, P. H. Burnette and Wm. Savage were present. Mr. Lanz did not put in an appearance, and the jury and Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth, the coroner, waited for an hour. Finally an attachment was issued and given into the hands of Chester Doyle for service. Mr. Lanz did not put in an appearance, he refused to attend the inquest, stating that he was not an American citizen, and therefore the coroner had no authority over him. High Sheriff Brown was appealed to by Mr. Lanz over the telephone without effect, and the latter then accompanied Mr. Doyle into the presence of the Deputy Sheriff. Mr. Lanz again stated his objection to serving, but the law was read to him. When the Deputy came to the part which reads "I shall forthwith issue his summons to six good and lawful men of the district," Mr. Lanz confessed himself defeated. The coroner fined him \$5 for non-attendance and the inquest was set over until this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Mr. Lanz was sworn in as a jurymen and then suggested that an autopsy should be held on the body of the Japanese, to show that he was a willing and interested juror. The inquest is to be held upon the Japanese' body to determine the liability of the Portuguese boy who is held a prisoner at the station house. Both were scuffling on Wednesday at the Club Stables annex on Kukui street. The Portuguese was holding to a post and the Japanese had lifted his legs off the ground. When he dropped the Portuguese kicked backwards striking the Japanese in a vital place, and it is supposed he died from the results of the blow. The name of the Portuguese is Manuel Pacheco.


