## VERDICT SET ASIDE

### Jury Finding Does Not Satisfy Court.

### JUDGE GEAR IS AGAIN REVERSED

#### Jury in Damage Suit Found for Defendant—Supreme Court Sits Today.

The jury in the case of David Kalepono vs. K. L. Kalei, a suit for damages for malicious prosecution, returned a verdict for the defendant Saturday afternoon, being out but half an hour. On their return with the finding plaintiff immediately moved for a new trial, on the ground that the verdict was contrary to the law and the evidence. Judge Humphreys, without hesitation, sustained the motion, and set aside the verdict of the 12 men, granting a new trial.

The suit was for \$5500 damages, which plaintiff claimed to have sustained by reason of his allegedly false arrest at Ewa on a charge of stealing taro. He was afterward discharged when the case came before the grand jury, and then brought suit on the ground that the prosecution was malicious and injurious to his feelings and reputation.

**WARREN CASE GOES OVER.**  
The Warren divorce suit, in which there are sensational allegations and even more sensational counter allegations in a cross-bill for separation, did not come up before Judge Robinson Saturday as had been anticipated. The jury trial being on before Judge Humphreys, the divorce case which is also a term matter could not be taken up, and it was continued until this morning.

**WHO WILL PRESIDE?**  
There is still some doubt as to who will be the presiding judge at the next term of Circuit Court. Under the rules of court recently adopted by the three judges, it is Judge Humphreys' turn to preside at the August term, but because of his early retirement from the bench he desires to be excused. The special term which is now being held was presided over from the start by the First Judge, though Judge Robinson has been sitting nearly the entire term. Judge Gear is back now and will start work today, but it is likely that Judge Robinson will be called upon to preside at the August term.

**SUPREME COURT.**  
The Supreme Court will meet this morning at 10 o'clock, though adjournment will probably be taken immediately for the term. Justice Galbraith leaves tomorrow for the coast, and there are very few cases of pressing importance upon the docket.

The fishery cases are the most important now before the Supreme Court, but as Chief Justice Frear and Justice Perry are disqualified an entire new bench will be called upon to decide these matters. The cases are taken up during the absence of Galbraith. As nearly all the attorneys are also interested in these cases, it will be difficult to get a court to determine the matter. Very likely Judge Estee or Judges from other circuits will be asked to preside, though it is not probable that the cases will be heard until after the return of Judge Galbraith.

**JUDGE GEAR REVERSED.**  
Judge Gear was reversed by the Supreme Court Saturday in the case of Mary J. Montano vs. W. R. Castle in which the lower court found for plaintiff. In this case it appears that the Montanos were indebted to Castle in the sum of \$15,000, secured by a trust deed on certain property belonging to plaintiff. At the instance of plaintiff, defendant was authorized as agent to sell one tract of land for \$25,000, which he did, transferring the mortgage held by him, the balance of the consideration being two promissory notes for \$3000. Plaintiff contended that she authorized the sale only as to \$15,000 on the mortgage, and that the remainder was to have been cash, and though she accepted interest amounting to \$700 she alleged that she did not do it with the intention of ratifying the investment.

The Supreme Court, in an opinion written by Justice Galbraith, says: "That if the plaintiff did not authorize the taking of the mortgage, she afterwards with full knowledge of the facts ratified the acts of defendant in accepting it. If the plaintiff was dissatisfied with the security it was certainly her duty when the facts came to her knowledge on January 3, to have made her objections known and if they were not satisfied to have repudiated the sale. She cannot be permitted to accept the benefit of the sale so far as she may consider it to her advantage to do so and repudiate the remainder. The contract of sale must be accepted as a whole or repudiated in its entirety."

"We do not think the evidence sustains the finding and decree of the Circuit Judge. The decree appealed from is reversed and the cause remanded with directions to dismiss the bill."


