SANITATION IS BETTER

Tracy Reports on Health of City.

KEWALO DISTRICT MUCH IMPROVED

Private Subscriptions for Building of Government Sewer on River and Kukui Streets.

The report of City Sanitary Officer Tracy for July deals principally with the benefits derived by the city from the recent improvements in the sewerage system in Kewalo, and the one contemplated on River street. The following is the report:

Honolulu, H. T., August 1, 1922.

Sir: Following is the report of the City Sanitary Officer for month of July, 1922.

During the month 21 applications to build have been received and 17 of them have been approved. I have also approved 3 permits applied for previous to July 1.

One application is in the hands of the Survey Department and I am holding four, two of which have not yet been investigated, and the other two are in violation of Regulation No. 2. Two builders without permits have been notified to file their applications and have done so.

Six cesspools have been located during the month, all outside the sewer limits.

Five buildings have been moved or altered so as to conform to the sanitary regulations.

I have made 37 inspections during the month, 54 of which were examinations of lots and new buildings.

Thirty certificates for restaurant, hotel or lodging house licenses have been applied for and 23 have been issued. Seven are held until the places have been put into sanitary condition.

Of the certificates applied for prior to July 1st, three have been granted and six are still held.

The number of adults which can be lodged by law in these buildings licensed is 887.

Four formal complaints have been filed and three nuisances have been abated, one case is in hand.

Five 48-hour notices have been served and the nuisance in each case was abated without further prosecution.

Three notices to remove ducks have been served. The time has not yet expired.

Thirty-three 30-day notices to connect to the sewer have been served in Kewalo and the work in the majority of cases is progressing very favorably.

Principally through the efforts of Inspector Francis \$1,255 has been subscribed to lay the Government sewer in River street from Beretania street to a point about 200 above Kukui, and also 200 feet in Kukui street. The pipe for the sewer is on a sailing vessel and just as soon as she arrives the sewer will be laid.

The completion of the sewer in Kewalo is rapidly putting a very dangerous portion of the city into good sanitary condition because the property owners are more willing to connect to the sewer and get rid of the cesspools which at the best were a nuisance on account of the tide water raising and filling them to overflowing at times.

The new cement drain at Kewalo which is nearing completion has completely drained the streets which formerly were flooded, and Ward street which was three feet in water and mud is now completely dry. The cesspools which gave so much trouble by overflowing due to this flooding have ceased being a menace to the public in general.

INSPECTOR'S REPORTS.

Reports of inspectors for the past month were also submitted showing total inspections in the various districts as follows: No. 1, 80; No. 2, 337; No. 3, 1925; No. 4, 1025; No. 5, 1414; No. 6, 1009; No. 7, 1514; No. 8, 1454; No. 9, 1134; No. 10, 1208; No. 11, 1750; No. 12, 554. Inspector Kinsey in this district reports:

"The banana plantations along the Waikiki road have all been induced to put their respective premises in a much better state of sanitation by raising dwelling houses, destroying shacks and skids and generally cleaning up."

GYPSY READERS OF PALMS ARRESTED

Two of the Argentine gypsies, whose arrival from Sydney was noted last week in the Advertiser, were arrested yesterday on the charge of vagrancy while making a nuisance of themselves in the Honolulu drug store. The women entered the place and endeavored to tell the fortunes of all present by so-called each one in turn. Their presence was obnoxious to the proprietors who sent a call for the police. The women protested loudly at the police station against imprisonment and Jim Kupieha was compelled to pick them up and carry them below. They have annoyed people in various parts of town and several complaints have been made against them. It is not believed that the camp intends to remain long in Honolulu, as the gypsies have said they merely stopped off here en route to San Francisco, and would get out again in three or four weeks.


