### How F. M. English Died.

News of the sad death of Mr. F. M. English, in a railway accident, reached Honolulu on July 9th. The wreck occurred near Colorado Springs on June the 29th, and there were nearly 400 passengers on the train at the time. Mr. English twice visited Honolulu and at one time was choir master in St. Andrew's cathedral. He married a daughter of Mrs. Allan Herbert of Honolulu, who survives him. The following is quoted from the Colorado Springs Gazette of June 30: "Mr. English was expected to preside at the organ at St. Stephen's Episcopal church at the service at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, and his absence could not be accounted for. The faithful organist was on his way to his post, but was cold in death when the church hour came; but the congregation did not know it. After waiting 15 minutes for the organist Mr. W. F. Crosby was asked to play. He found the organ locked and Mr. English had the key, so he was compelled to break it open. It was not until after church was over that the Rev. Mr. Taft received word that Mr. English had been killed. When the body was found in the wreck the music for today's services at the church was found by its side. It was sent down here with the body, and was placed on top of the body in the coffin. When it became known who the dead man was, there was general regret throughout the city for the late Mr. English was well known and well liked. Mr. English was born in England 54 years ago. He has been a musician from his early youth. As a youth he studied music in Belgium and France, and earned the title of Bachelor of Music. Later he attended St. John's College, Oxford, from which he took the degree of A. B. with honors."

### LOCAL BREVITIES.

The coronation of King Edward was observed at the British consulate on Saturday.

It is reported in Hilo that the oil hulk Kaimioa will be towed from Honolulu to that port.

The Y. M. C. A. meeting yesterday was held on Young's Island, those attending going out in a launch.

The Japanese consul, M. Saito, will leave on the 23rd of this month for Japan to spend a four months' vacation.

D. P. R. Isenberg will sing at the concert to be given under the auspices of St. Clement's choir and guild tomorrow evening.

The Fifth District delegates are reported to be booming Police Judge Wilcox for delegate. The judge has not been approached about the matter as yet.

The Board of Health has sent its circular letter to physicians calling for a stricter observance of the rules in regard to reporting contagious diseases.

The customs collections for the year ending June 30th as reported by Collector Stackable amount to \$1,327,000. The total exports of the islands for the year amounted to \$24,793,735.

F. J. Cross returned Saturday from Kauai, where he superintended the construction of the new pole for the wireless telegraph system. It is located about a mile from Nawiliwili.

Mr. and Mrs. E. Conlin leave Tuesday on the Sonoma for the coast. Mr. Conlin has been here for five months, having been employed on the construction work of the Young building.

Revenue Collector Chamberlain has received from the Treasury Department advance copies of the report sent by him to Washington for the year ending June 30th. The collections of internal revenue for the year were \$70,325.

Lizzie Akana was brought to the station house on Saturday morning and charged with assault on Akana Espinda, having cut one of his arms with a penknife. She claims Espinda asked her for money, and not receiving it, threatened her, when she, in self-defense, used the penknife.

The Fort and King street crossing for the Rapid Transit line was placed in position Saturday. Pain's cars were compelled to transfer on either side of the crossing during the operation. Within a week it is expected to put a similar crossing in place at Nuuanu and King streets and then the connection will be made with the Kalihi line.

Owing to other attractions which called away most of the Portuguese residents of Punchbowl, the mass meeting of the Portuguese Political Club, which was to have been held in Lualaba hall yesterday at 2 p. m., was postponed until Friday evening. Most of the speakers were on hand, but an audience was lacking.

The band will give the following moonlight concert this week: Monday at Emma square; Tuesday at the Moana hotel; Wednesday at the Thomas square; Thursday at the Hawaiian hotel, in attendance at the reception to be tendered to Bishop Restarick. If the time is convenient the band will play at the departure of steamers.


