

### YACHT LA PALOMA GOT HOME FIRST

But Time Limit Was Exceeded and Rice Must be Run Over.

Saturday's match yacht race from the lighthouse to Rabbit Island and return was a failure and will have to be run over again. The competing yachts had agreed on a time limit of nine hours but neither yacht finished in anything like that time. La Paloma got back early Sunday morning but the Gladys did not put in an appearance until just after midday on Sunday. Light winds and calms caused the race to be a failure.

The sloop-rigged Pa Paloma was under the command of Captain Macfarlane while the Gladys was skippered by Commodore Hobron. The two yachts went out by the lighthouse just before nine o'clock on Saturday morning. A very light wind was prevailing and this gave the Gladys an opportunity to lead the way. She got a long ways ahead of the challenger but rounding Diamond Head La Paloma got out her light sails and overhauled the Gladys off Rabbit Island. She lost the lead soon after rounding this island and getting into light winds and calms the two racers made but little progress. Commodore Hobron stood out to sea in an effort to get a better wind but Macfarlane hugged the land. In this move the latter proved the wisest for as night came on the vessel got the land winds and was able to beat her opponent in by about eight hours to the spar buoy off Honolulu harbor. After darkness set in neither boat got a view of the other. La Paloma arrived at the finish at 4:30 o'clock Sunday morning but it was about one o'clock in the afternoon before the Gladys put in an appearance. As the time limit was exceeded the event will not be declared a race and the vessels must go out again to settle the matter. La Paloma will be sent down to Pearl Harbor today. When the deciding race comes off there should be keen interest in the event as the Paloma made an excellent showing on Saturday despite the poor winds.

### MURDERERS SENT HERE FROM KAUAI

Another Man Confined Almost in Shadow of the Gallows.

When the Mikahala arrived yesterday morning from Kauai there were four passengers who disembarked who were of unusual interest to the remainder of the passengers. One was a police officer and the other three wore handcuffs. One of the latter was Yoshikawa Denjiro, a Japanese, who was sentenced to be hanged by Judge Hardy, and is held here awaiting final disposition of the case. Another was Chong Koong Wai, a Chinese sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment in Oahu prison and \$3.50 fine for murder in the first degree, and the third is Francisco Serra, sentenced to two years' imprisonment and fined \$18.50 for assault with a deadly weapon. All the prisoners were immediately transferred from the steamer to Oahu prison.

There are now three men detained in Oahu prison pending the untangling of legal technicalities to permit the High Sheriff to carry out the orders of two judges to hang each "by the neck until he is dead." George Ferris and Kimura, sentenced to death by hanging, make up the trio. No time was specified by Judge Hardy as to when the High Sheriff was to place the noose about Yoshikawa's neck, and there is a possibility that the gallows of the prison will shortly be erected to carry out the sentence.




