## WATER-FRONT NEWS



### MOANA HAD ALL HER STEAM UP

Reached This Port a Day Ahead of Her Schedule Time.

Captain Carey, the aged and popular commander of the favorite liner of the Canadian-Australian "All-Red" steamers, gave his friends a huge surprise yesterday by reaching this port from the Colonies a day sooner than expected and leaving port again for Victoria and Vancouver almost before the public were aware that the steamer was here. Carey is pushing the steamer along with an idea of making a fast run in celebration of his fiftieth trip across the Pacific and of his fifty years of work on the sea.

Captain Carey is well liked by all who have ever had the pleasure of travelling on his vessel. From stoke-hole to the officer's cabin, aboard the Moana, the skipper is regarded as every man's friend. Everyone likes him. When he appears on deck in the morning he always has a cheery "good morning" for every person that he sees. As a navigator he has the reputation of being a very careful and efficient man.

"Good fellows" seems to be the rule aboard the Moana. Purser Bendall is just the sort of jolly person that school boys are told are in charge of the many passengers who tour the seas on pleasure and on business. Included in his make up there seems to be a vein of humor. He describes the voyage of the Moana from Sydney to this port as follows: "The R. M. S. Moana left Sydney on the eighth of September at 1:10 p. m. arrived in Moreton Bay (Brisbane) on the tenth at 4:30 a. m. and sailed again on the following morning at one o'clock, arriving at Suva on the fifteenth at 2 p. m. Sailed again at 11:30 p. m. and arrived at Honolulu today with a few tons of steam to spare. The waters of the Great Pacific during the entire voyage were as a 'sea of oil.'"

The Moana had but few through passengers but took a number from this port. She sailed early in the afternoon for Victoria.

### A LONDON PUNCHER ON BOARD.

One of the passengers on the Moana was Mr. Bradbury of London Punch, the famous British political funny paper. Mr. Bradbury is of course expected to make a joke for the benefit of the other passengers quite often. On the trip up he told this story: "I was talking with the skipper the other morning at Brisbane. We saw some sea birds and I asked the skipper what they were. 'O,' he said, 'those are my wife's chickens.' Of course I guardedly asked him what he meant. I expected one of those American gags. The captain's reply was: 'What, have you never heard of Mother Carey's chickens?' It's one on me." This was Mr. Bradbury's only joke. It was worthy of "Punch."

### TRAVELS ON A VIOLIN.

"Professor" Bernhardt Walters was another Moana passenger. He has circled the globe several times. Always lives on the fat of the countries he visits and does it on a small violin. He toured Australia and New Zealand while "down below" on this trip and reaped a harvest.

### MAIL FOR COLONIAL PREMIERS.

The Moana brought considerable mail and files of Australian newspapers for Premier Barton, of Australia, and Premier "Dick" Seddon, of New Zealand, who are expected to arrive in Honolulu on the steamer Aorangi on next Saturday from Victoria on their return trip from the Coronation. A large number of Honolulu Britshers will probably be at the Pacific Mail wharf to give the Colonials a welcome.

### Becalmed for Seven Days.

The schooner Ada, which returned to port last night with a cargo of rice from Punaluu after an absence of a couple of weeks over at Hawaii carrying rice to Hilo, had a rather dull experience while off Hawaii coast about a week ago. She struck a calm one afternoon and remained at about the same point for seven days, not getting a sufficient amount of wind to move her during all of that time.

### Hulks Remain in Row.

The notice from the Public Works Department that the hulks which now disgrace The Row would have to be moved seems to have been given but scant attention. The notice called for their removal within ten days' time but no effort seems to have been made to get them out of the way. It is probable that Captain Fuller will have to blow them up.

### MANY KICKS ON POOR LIGHTING

Dangers Run by Sailors Minimized by Customs Men's Watchfulness.

The insufficient lighting of the wharves along the waterfront and the approaches to them is daily becoming more apparent. Hardly a day goes by but some case of a man having a narrow escape from an unwilling bath and possible death by stepping from the street into the water at night is reported. The night inspectors of Uncle Sam's Customs Service frequently save sailors from probable death by drowning along the waterfront.

When the bark R. P. Rithet was in port a Customs' man one night saved one of the sailors of that vessel from stepping into the water at exactly the same place as the ship's carpenter did a few nights ago when he came to an untimely end. Now the men in uniform keep a sharp lookout at night for drunken sailors who wander along the front in search of their vessels. When they know that a sailor is intoxicated they keep an eye on him to see that he does not wander off a wharf.

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### FOUND BRICKS INSTEAD OF RAZORS

Practical Joker Makes Trouble for an Employee of the Alameda.

A Jewish employe on the Alameda was the victim of a practical joke either between San Francisco and Honolulu, or between the Oceanic dock and an uptown barber shop. The gentlemen mentioned has been in the habit of acting as errand man for a number of barbers in Honolulu and dealers in San Francisco. Whenever special kinds of razors, cosmetics, or other tonsorial materials are desired the gentlemen fills the order at the Coast. Ordinarily he carries the articles in a satchel. This time he had about \$60 worth of goods which took up more room than usual, and a large bag was requisitioned.

An expressman was hired at the dock and the bag sent up town to a shop. When the errand man opened his sack later in the day what was his amazement to find it filled, not with barber's materials, but with bricks. There was weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth and the errand man is still on a hunt for the joker.





