

WATERFRONT NEWS



A picture of the steamship China taken from the deck of the giant liner Korea while both vessels were at sea and each going at a rate of fifteen miles an hour in opposite directions. The vessels were within speaking distance of each other. The occasion of the big steamers meeting was a novel one for Captain Seabury, the commander of the Korea, as it was the first time he had an opportunity of viewing from a distance, at sea, the vessel which he so ably commanded for many years. The steamers passed each other on Saturday, Sept. 6, near the islands.

MANY BRIDES ON PACIFIC LINER

China Arrives From San Francisco With Numerous Passengers Yesterday.

The Pacific Mail steamer China arrived from San Francisco yesterday afternoon. She was deeply loaded with through freight and carried a large number of passengers, some from San Francisco but many as members of tourist parties that are to tour the Orient. She had considerable mail, including six days' later news.

As the vessel is to call at Manila on this trip she has a number of passengers and considerable freight for that port. Among the passengers are a number of brides. Mrs. David Greene is going to Shanghai where she is to be married to an ex-naval officer who is now engaged in railroad construction. Miss J. A. Macauley and Miss E. Carman are both going to Manila where they will be married upon their arrival. Miss Carman's fiance is a naval officer.

Among the passengers who got off here were the Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Du Monin. They were married on the morning of their departure from San Francisco. The Rev. Mr. Du Monin has been assigned to work in this diocese by Bishop Nichols. The Rev. Mr. Kincaid and family returned after a couple of months visit to the Coast. Dr. and Mrs. Day returned after a lengthy absence in Europe. The berthing of the deeply laden vessel was a slow job yesterday. She remained opposite the wharf for almost an hour before she could be got alongside and the gangway put in place.

Ship Dirigo Sighted.

The ship Dirigo, on which the son of President Wight of the Wilder Steamship Company left Honolulu as third officer of the vessel in June for the trip to New York, evidently made straight south from Honolulu. On July 17th the vessel was spoken in latitude 21°28' South and 158°8' West.

The schooner Henry K. Hall bound from Newcastle to Honolulu was spoken on August 19th in latitude 27°49' North and longitude 133 West.

Vessels on the Way

The bark Amy Turner sailed from San Francisco for Honolulu on Sept. 18. The schooner Aloha left Port Gamble for Honolulu on the same date. The British ship Gantock Rock left Iquique for Honolulu on August 14. The ship Falls of Clyde left San Francisco on Sept. 14th for Hilo. The schooner Transit left Astoria on the 14th for Hilo.

The "American-Hawaiian" Fleet.
 The American-Hawaiian steamer Oregonian was expected to arrive at San Francisco from New York on September 23rd. The Nebraskan, sister ship to the Nevada, is now on the way around the Horn from New York. The Alaskan, largest of the fleet, is also on her way from New York to San Francisco and Honolulu.

Mohican Had Good Cargo.

Captain Kelley brought the bark Mohican along from San Francisco yesterday. She is chock full of freight and Captain Kelley says that the cargo situation on the Coast has improved greatly. He says: "No wind or vessels were sighted on the way down."

Pacific Mail Promotions.

Second Officer Pearson of the China has been promoted to the position of first officer. Third Officer Kitchen has been advanced to second place and Third Officer Arps who has been on the Panama run has been promoted to the same position on the China.

Bark St. James Spoken.

The bark St. James, which is now out 114 days from Savannah for this port with a cargo of coal, was spoken on August 14th in latitude 56 S. and longitude 66 W.

SMALL VESSEL'S VERY HARD LUCK

London Missionary Schooner Destroyed in the South Seas.

The London Missionary Society's schooner Southern Cross was wrecked while carrying a number of missionaries and some native children on the eastern side of Tahiti on the evening of Sept. 1st. Natives on the shore put out in boats and rescued those on board although the schooner was a total wreck. The Southern Cross was built in San Francisco a couple of years ago. One of her first captains committed suicide. A mate was washed overboard from her. On her last cruise her captain refused to go to sea because he had not been paid his salary and the man who took his place ran the vessel ashore.

After the American Cup.

LONDON, September 16.—The challenge of Sir Thomas Lipton for another series of races for the America's cup will be forwarded within a few days, so as to reach the New York Yacht Club by October 1st. Confirmation was forthcoming today of the report that the Shamrock III will be milled steel instead of manganese bronze, as in the case of the previous challengers. The new yacht's design does not differ materially from those of the previous Shamrocks, although there is some divergence from the old lines forward. The new boat will not be so costly as the Shamrock II.

Remodeling the Rosecrans.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—The steamer Rosecrans, purchased some weeks ago by the Matson Navigation Company from the transport service, will be taken from her anchorage off Sausalito today to the Union Iron Works to be overhauled and remodeled into an oil carrier, for use in the trade between the Coast and Hawaiian ports. The work is to be superintended in great part by Captain Johnson of the bark Roderick Dhu, who is to be her commander. He is now en route from Hilo in the Roderick Dhu.

Wireless Service to Kauai.

The wireless telegraph service is to be extended to Kauai. Men are now at work on summer island constructing a mast which is to be 203 feet high and which will be set up near Waianae as the receiving point on Oahu. It is being made in three sections. One eighty-six foot section is being built out of one of the masts of the old Twilight.

Some Big Catches Fish.

Steamers arriving from Kauai ports yesterday bring news of some great fish catches. During the past week thousands of fish have been caught off Waiwea. At Hanalei Mr. Birkmyre is reported to have captured 4000 mullet in one haul in the Hanalei river.

Goes for Guano Cargo.



Honolulu Vessels at Destinations.

The Norwegian bark City of Agra arrived at Eureka on Sept. 16. The bark Kaiulani arrived at San Francisco on Sept. 16, after a 32 days' voyage from this port. The schooner Robert Lewers arrived out on Sept. 17.

Annie Johnson Laid Up.

The well-known bark Annie Johnson is laid up in San Francisco because of poor business. Her skipper is Captain Williams.


