DON'T NEED A TRUSTEE

Sumner Demurs to Petition of Bishop.

JUDGE ROBINSON CALLS CALENDAR

Will Continue to Hear Jury Cases, In Spite of Humphreys' Attacks.

John K. Sumner yesterday filed a demurrer to the petition of his trustee, Bishop Gulstan Roper, who asks that he be allowed to resign, and that a new trustee be appointed in his place.

Sumner is now represented by Magoon & Peters, who a few weeks ago were trying to have him declared insane, and placed under guardianship. Sumner alleges that the court has no jurisdiction, inasmuch as the trust created by the deed was voluntary, and revocable at the pleasure of the grantor, John K. Sumner. It is also stated that no request has been made of Sumner by said Gulstan R. Roper to be relieved of the trust, or to have a substitute named in his place, and that it does not appear that Sumner has not requested complainant to terminate the trust, and reconvey the property to John K. Sumner.

It is further set out that the \$110,000 received from the Oahu Railway Co. did not become a part of the trust, nor does it appear that the \$48,000 now in the hands of Bishop & Co. should be subject to the trust. It is further intimated that the will mentioned has been revoked.

Maria S. Davis and R. W. Davis also defendants, demur on the same grounds.

ROBINSON OPENS COURT.

Judge Robinson called a jury yesterday morning and in the afternoon went over the calendar of civil cases. In spite of Humphreys' attacks upon the two judges holding court concurrently, Judge Robinson will continue to hear jury cases.

Yesterday the civil calendar up to and including number 100 was called, and those cases in which the attorneys were ready were set for hearing.

Judge Robinson excused from service the following jurors:— C. Bellman, J. F. Bowler, Robert A. Carlyle, John Kamaoanulu, Chas. A. Kash and Chas. Marques. The last named juror was not of age.

The case of Wilder Steamship Co. vs. W. H. Pain was set down for trial on Wednesday.

The following cases are set down for hearing before Judge De Bolt on Wednesday: Nos. 6, 8, 15, 16, and 17.

SUES FOR MERCHANTALIER.
D. W. Anderson has brought suit against the Grieve Publishing Co. to foreclose the mortgage on a Mergenthaler Linotype machine bought for the use of the Republican. Plaintiff alleges that on December 17, 1900, the respondent being indebted to the Mergenthaler Linotype Co. of New York for \$2,390 gave eight promissory notes for \$298.75 each, giving a mortgage to secure their payment. These notes were on October 10, 1902, assigned to D. W. Anderson. Four of the notes have been paid but the three notes becoming due March 29, 1902, June 20th, 1902, and September 20th, 1902, have not been paid, and though demand has been made upon defendant, he has failed and neglected to do so.

Complainant alleges that there is now due him \$1,195 with 6 per cent. interest from December 17, 1900, and asks that the amount be ordered paid or that the mortgage be foreclosed, and the machine sold to satisfy his claim.

COURT NOTES.
An answer has been filed by J. A. Magoon to the suit of Frederika Noite for damages for trespass. Magoon claims that he was within his rights, and was entitled to ingress and egress over the lands of plaintiff, and says that in tearing down the obstructions in his way he simply abated a private nuisance.

Cecil Brown has petitioned for discharge as administrator of the estate of Wm. Meyer. An inventory shows the property to be worth \$2,418.35.

M. T. Simonton has reported upon the eighth and ninth accounts of J. A. Magoon, administrator of the estate of William Brash, finding them to be correct.

In the divorce libel of Emily C. Williams vs. E. A. Williams, libellee has moved to set aside service on the ground that the summons is defective. An answer making general denial has been filed in the case of J. Hayashi vs. F. Iwata, a counter claim of \$1,716.49 also being set up.



---THE PLANO---

The plano or plano lens is a plain, flat piece of glass or pebble, of equal thickness and density; clear, perfectly transparent, and free from blemish or flaw. It does not change, enlarge or diminish an object, is but little used in eye glass or spectacle by the legitimate optician—only for eye protection from dust or wind, and for appearance before a perfect eye, when its mate be defective.

This is the first of a series of six talks on lenses. Next lens described will be the plus sphere—a lens worn by three of five glass wearers, used for the correction of Hyperopia or far sight.
