**THE SUMNER CASE AGAIN**

**Unprofessionalism Has Been Charged.**

**HUMPHREYS WAS TO BE ON TWO SIDES**

**Magoon & Peters Ask That the Law Firm Be Stricken From Record.**


Accusations of unprofessional conduct are made against Humphreys, Thompson & Watson in a motion filed yesterday by Magoon & Peters to have their names stricken off the record as counsel for the Ellis children. The attorneys for Mrs. Davis and John K. Sumner allege that Humphreys and Thompson were employed as attorneys for Sumner, and also for the Ellises, and that they acted for the latter when their interests were hostile to Sumner.

In the affidavit and motion filed by Magoon & Peters it is alleged:

"That they, the said F. E. Thompson, E. M. Watson and A. S. Humphreys, and all of them did heretofore, in an action in the above entitled court, entitled 'In the matter of the petition of Maria S. Davis to be appointed the guardian of the estate of John K. Sumner, an insane person,' represented, acted, and were the attorneys for the said John K. Sumner. That the said cause was dismissed by the consent of all parties therein and upon the dismissal thereof, certain property, to-wit: the Reef property, and subject to the trusts in said trust deed fully described in the petition herein, was sold to the Oahu Railway and Land Company for the sum of \$105,000.00. That from said sum of \$105,000.00 there was paid by the said John K. Sumner unto the said Victoria Ellis Buffandeau, William S. Ellis, John S. Ellis and Maria S. Davis, respondents herein, the sum of \$10,000 each; that during all of said transactions the said F. E. Thompson, E. M. Watson and A. S. Humphreys represented, acted and were the attorneys for the said John K. Sumner. That on behalf of the said John K. Sumner the said attorneys did secure from Maria S. Davis a release and acquittance of all her right, title and interest in and to the property of the said John K. Sumner under and by virtue of the said trust deed as aforesaid. That one of the issues raised in the above entitled cause, by reason of the joint and separate answer of the said Victoria Ellis Buffandeau, William S. Ellis and John S. Ellis, and the answer of the said John K. Sumner, is whether or not the said sum of \$10,000.00 was paid to the said Victoria Ellis Buffandeau, William S. Ellis and John S. Ellis, and each of them, in contemplation of the revocation of said trust deed by said John K. Sumner to the petitioner herein and upon the agreement and understanding between the said John K. Sumner and the said Victoria Ellis Buffandeau, William S. Ellis and John S. Ellis, and each of them that the consideration for the payment to them of the sum of \$10,000.00 each was the release and acquittance by them and each of them of all their right, title and interest in and to the property of the said John K. Sumner, under and by virtue of the said trust deed as aforesaid."

In an affidavit by E. C. Peters it is alleged that the failure of Humphreys to procure a discharge and release from the Ellises, thus protecting the interests of Sumner, was "against the interest of the said Sumner and in violation of their professional duty to him, and abusing the confidence and trust reposed in them by him." The court is asked for an opinion as to whether the firm should be permitted to further appear in behalf of the Ellis children, their interests being adverse and hostile to those of Sumner.

Sumner's affidavit related the fact of his return from Tahiti, and a visit to Humphreys's office with Willie Ellis. Henry E. Highton was there, and was paid \$500 as a retainer. Humphreys was on the bench at the time, but agreed to act as counsel as he was to retire in a few days, and Mr. Sumner says he so understood. He claims further that he heard Willie Ellis say something about giving him \$25,000, and that Mr. Humphreys replied: "We will put him under guardianship," whereat Sumner became angry and started home. Sumner also tells about the final settlement with the Davises and the Ellis children, each receiving \$10,000, and says that Highton was paid \$2,500 and Humphreys, Thompson & Watson received the same fee, and that he understood that the latter firm was to act for him until the settlement of his troubles. In conclusion, Sumner alleges that Humphreys,

**TOURISTS WILL COME TO HAWAII.**

annually, or making winter trips to California and no further. They want to see Hawaii worked up and are willing to help do this. Many of them even now receive queries in regard to the islands, but the lack of a cable always prevented business men from coming here, and unfavorable replies were invariably returned. With the cable, there will be no further objection to business men coming for a few months at a time, for they can be in constant communication with the business centers.

"The passenger agents with whom I talked are in favor of advertising the islands extensively as a means of bringing tourists to see the possibilities. Some of them will boom Hawaii in their own publications, believing it to be a means of inducing tourists to visit here. The New York Central was especially taken with the idea, and their December issue of the Four Track News contained an illustrated article upon Hawaii, as a starter. They promise also to publish articles in the coming issues, and I am preparing facts and pictures for their use. Another railroad has added a line about Hawaii to their ad. running in the Chicago papers, and nearly all of them promised to assist in a like manner. I came too late to get any notices in their winter publications, which were brought out in September, but next year they will advertise Hawaii extensively.

"All the railroad men say they will do what they can for us, but it will require more than that. It will take lots of hard work on our part and will cost lots of money, but I have no doubt but that tourists can be influenced to come this way if the attractions of the islands are properly presented.

"Eighty thousand tourists are booked to visit Los Angeles alone this winter. They will spend at least \$100 apiece, so you can readily see how much that amounts to for that city. A part, at least, of this number could be induced to come a little farther and visit the islands. There are lots of things here they would like to see, and now with the cable there is nothing to stand in the way. If the Associated Press would send out even a small reference to Hawaii it would be published in nearly every paper in the United States, and would be the best kind of advertising for the islands.

"I made the trip only for the Oahu Railway, but am of course ready to give my views to any of the commercial bodies of the city at their request."
