

### SONOMA ONE DAY BEHIND SCHEDULE

Vessel Will Not Arrive in Honolulu Until Next Thursday.

Irwin & Co. received a cablegram from San Francisco yesterday announcing that the steamer Sonoma left the Coast yesterday afternoon.

The vessel should have sailed from San Francisco on Thursday but was probably delayed by the English mails for Australia. The Advertiser received a cablegram announcing a big storm in the middle-Western states which undoubtedly slowed the mails coming overland. The Oceanic steamers are never delayed in leaving San Francisco except through the non-arrival of the mails from the East.

The Sonoma was scheduled to arrive here on next Wednesday, but owing to her late departure cannot reach here before Thursday.
